New England Hosts *FIVE*World's Biggest Disc Golf Tourneys

The official press release said "A Million Throws in One Day". On May 9, 1992, nearly 300 golfers gathered at courses in New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut to participate in the World's Biggest Disc Golf Tournament, the brainchild of promoter John Hauck of Irving, Texas. With the purpose of introducing new people to disc golf, the tournaments were very successful, as the majority of players had never played before. Each participant received a golf disc and a T-shirt for only \$10, and got to play a round of golf besides. The following reports from our remote news bureaus summarize the action.

Sunridge Development, Rindge, N. H.

Only two disc golfers represented the Granite State on May 9. Playing in an early morning drizzle, Peter Anderson bested Toddy Brodeur on Mach II poleholes with an even par 54 to win the Open (and only) division.

Wachusett Mountain, Princeton, Mass.

68 people registered at the central Massachusetts World's Biggest site, the Wachusett Mountain Ski Area. The course was spectacular, winding its way up, down and around the lower ski trails, dodging patches of snow, traversing through the woods -- variety made for an interesting course for the veteran and newcomer alike. TD Steve Hartwell awarded prizes in eight categories -- Peter Anderson & Jason Southwick, Men's Open, 46; John Gakeler, Men's Amateur, 52; Chuck White, Men's Novice, 52; Joy Hartwell, Women's Open (pro tees), 65; Christine Zajac, Women's Amateur, 53; Deborah Baiano, Women's Novice, 62; Scooter Feely, Master's, 52; Martin Desch, Juniors, 59. Peter Anderson nailed an amazing s-curve ace on hole #13. Thanks to Wachusett Mountain Ski Area and Boston Kite for sponsorship.

Burgess Park, Marstons Mills, Mass.

Lev and Nancy Malakhoff hosted the Cape Cod version of the World's Biggest at the permanent object course in Burgess Park. 87 entrants were tallied, of which 43 were new players. Competition was stiff, and tiebreakers were needed in three of the four divisions. Dan Griffith took the Men's Open with a 56, Nancy Malakhoff won Women's Open with 67, Bill Thomas bested the Novice Men with 62, and Mike Marralson topped Juniors with 65. The first few foursomes went out in misty raw weather, while everyone else was treated to beautiful warm sun-

shine. The local Cape papers had a field day running stories and pictures of the event, making it the best publicized disc tourney seen in New England in a many years. A great time was had by all, and the most frequent quote of the event was, "When are you going to do the next one?"

Roseland Park, Woodstock, Conn.

Though competing with two spring festivals, a regatta and a Ku Klux Klan rally, 45 players enjoyed the Connecticut World's Biggest, of whom nearly 90% were first timers. Toddy Brodeur tied with Carl Emerson for the best score of 46. Carl Emerson and Jonathan Williams each recorded an ace during the tournament. TD Neal Leon thanked Leroy Falconi, the Jazzy Jasmine Disc Catching Canine Show, the Woodstock Sky Divers, and the 40 business sponsors who helped make the event a success. Even better, because of the positive press, Roseland Park is now considering the installation of a permanent disc golf course.



The following is a discourse from Bob DeCosta on the future of disc sports in New England. He offers many timely suggestions, to which NEFA president Steve Hartwell has written responses.

Somewhere in New England in the year 2035...

The NEFA board is holding its Annual Meeting; present are Steve Hartwell, President; T.M. Dyer, Vice President; Rick Williams, Treasurer; Jason Southwick, Membership; Greg Black, Theo Cade, Toddy Brodeur and John Affonso, Tournament Committee; Dave Johnson, Judy Robbins and Tiina Booth, Membership Committee.

1800 hours -- The president calls the meeting to order.

1801 hours -- Steve: "Welcome to the Annual Meeting. We're looking forward to our best year ever in NEFA. Especially since we've all retired from our real jobs! I'm glad we could all make it this year."

"I'd like to open this meeting by once again asking Sunny to please, please retire from playing so we can finally hold the Inaugural Theo 'Sunny' Cade Memorial New England Championships. And also make it possible for one of us to win the Great Grand Goony Geezer division this year."

0829 hours -- Sunny
0830 hours kicks
0831 hours aside
0836 hours his
0840 hours walker
0850 hours and
0900 hours retorts:

"No way! I'm going to keep playing until I've heard Willard Scott say my name twice on the Today Show. Besides, Jude said that I could play one more year so we can finally sell that [expletive deleted] R.V. I promise I'll retire by 2050."

1000 hours -- The meeting slowly degenerates below human comprehension and time ceaselessly marches on.

1200 hours -- Somebody wakes up D.J. and Rick from their morning naps and the group furiously begins determining the year's schedule of events.

1350 hours -- The board sets the lofty goal of four events this season:

- 1) The 60th Rhode Island States -- TD, T.M. Dyer
- 2) The 61st Mass States -- TD, Greg Black
- 3) The 48th Pyramids -- TD, Jason Southwick
- 4) The 57th New Englands -- TD, Toddy Brodeur

This is the busiest schedule in six years. For the first time in ten years, all of the 1993 charter members that still live are in New England for the summer. It's going to be a great year.

1900 hours -- After all this work, the board decides to take a nap....

Is this the future of NEFA? Will it always be the same dozen or so people who do all the work, or will some new blood step forward and offer to shoulder some of the load?

Will New England disc tournaments ever be run on real time as opposed to "Frisbee^R Time"? How do we penalize people who are late?

What criteria do we use to determine what qualifies as a NEFA points event? Who makes the final decision?

I could go on and on, but I won't. Instead, I'll give you my ideas and ask you for yours. The following is a list of my favorite concepts. Steve's responses on behalf of the Board are in italics.

1) Hold an open meeting for all members of NEFA at the New England's this year. This way we can air out our dirty laundry and clean some of it up. Complaints and suggestions can be addressed as a group, and if need be, voted on.

The Open Meeting has happened for the past two years at our New England Championships. It will happen again this year.

2) This is actually the Vice President's "Pet Peeve", but I agree that something should be done. Set a schedule of all tournaments at the beginning of every year. This will help eliminate scheduling conflicts and give the membership a chance to adjust their schedules to it. It will also help us avoid losing players to the big national events like the U.S. Open. It also eliminates that dreaded "sometime in the fall" ambiguity.

A tough challenge, scheduling over ten tournaments with at least six tournament directors and as many locations. We've done better this year, with a mostly complete 1992 schedule published in the April NEFA News. We promise to try harder in 1993.

3) This one is the Rhode Island Championship Committee's biggest beef. Tournaments should be run on real time, not "Frisbee^R time". Every, and I do mean every, tournament I have ever attended in New England has started at a time other than the one planned. Not only does this cause confusion, but it penalizes player's who arrive on time and wait as long as two hours to play. The PDGA has a six stroke per hole late penalty, and I think this will cure our chronic late start problems.

Agreed, we should work with tournament directors and players to try and improve enforcement of start times -- I'm not sure we agree with the penalty.

4) The most often heard question by TDs this year: "Is this a NEFA points event?" Starting in 1993, I think all events published in the yearly schedule should be NEFA points events. In any other league or club I've been in, every game has counted. And since players will know the schedule early in the year, they should be able to maximize their attendance. This way, everybody has a chance to win or at least place respectably at year's end.

We will try to live up to this in 1993, with some exceptions -- e.g., doubles, out of region events, etc. We should

publish the entire calendar at the beginning of each season with NEFA points events clearly marked.

5) Send out a questionnaire to all 1992 members. We should come up with a list of questions that can be tallied to get a feel for what our membership is thinking. Ask what people think can be done to improve NEFA. Find out what the favorite disc sports are, and if we should run more of a particular event.

Great idea! Maybe we'll try it in the next newsletter.

6) Set up a "clubs within the club" system; i.e., Miantanomi Marigolds, Princeton Petunias, Amherst Azaleas, Boston Begonias, Diamond Hill Daisys. Hold three or four team events a year with varying formats. This will give us a chance to recruit more local people to join the NEFA family. It will also promote good, healthy competition that crosses all divisional and age barriers. Families will be able to play as a unit, and we all know that "the family that plays together..."

Another good idea! We'll cook up something for 1993; any volunteers to help figure out the format?

7) Encourage (translation: FORCE) more people to contribute something to the NEFA Newsletter. Not enough of us submit articles to this fine periodical. This newsletter is ours and should be used as an open forum to address any issue of concern. So write a response to this article and give NEFA your ideas. The Editor will gladly print anything from someone other than the dozen or so individuals who currently take the time to write. Speak up, NEFA wants to know!

Amen!

There's more, but I'll save it for a future issue. I welcome all feedback on these ideas, but I'd prefer to read it here so people can judge for themselves. I'd like to add this is not a "knock" on the current NEFA board. On the whole, they work very hard and deserve a pat on the back. But they can't do it alone; help them by getting involved.

Miantanomi Park, Newport, R. I.

Tournament director T. M. Dyer's extensive publicity resulted in the biggest draw in New England -- 95 players for the World's Biggest! Best scores on the Mach I poleholes were Toddy Brodeur with a 52 to win the Open, and John Affonso with a 52 to win the Masters. Bob DeCosta won a sweatshirt with an ace in the hole-in-one competition. Several local businesses and a radio station helped sponsor the event, further establishing the strong presence of disc golf in Miantanomi Park, which hill hopefull lead to permission for a permanent polehole course.

A Four State Trek

In the drizzly dawn of May 9 in the New Hampshire woods, two lonely disc golfers began their quest to play in four World's Biggest tournaments in four states. Before

the sun set, Todd Brodeur of Millis, Mass., and Peter Anderson of Nashua, N.H., completed 72 holes of disc golf on courses in N.H., Mass., Conn. and R.I. Even more amazing, Peter posted top score in two of the four events he played (N.H. and Mass.), while Todd did the same for the other two (Conn. and R.I.) The two hope to enter the Disc-er Book of World Records for their feats! To sum it all up, Brodeur penned an epic poem of the experience:

Early morning tee in New Hampshire, in a fog. 10:30 in Mass., down the mountain, around the logs.

It showed on his face, As Pete sunk an S-turn ace.

Todd said, "Add up the scores, And let's get out of this place."

Down on to Connecticut, as we ate lunch, Out on the driving range, Todd still had a hunch.

Birdie man, birdie man, Todd took Pete by one, Hey, maybe this game can still be some fun!

On to Rhode Island, we got there around 5, We were the last group and came out alive.

They said, "Here, throw more discs and win a prize!" We said, "No way, cuz we're 'disclimaxized'!"

"How low can you go?", I exclaim. My scorecard has turned into a dance card. Once again, it's time to apply my exclusive principles of *The Inner Game of Folf...*

Remember disco? Well, the theme song of just about every polehole I ever met was "Disco Duck," until I began to apply *Inner Game of Folf* techniques. (Out of modesty, he never told me until the very last that he spells his name backwards, but that's another story).

This first thing Dog told me about putting is "It's all in your mind".

"I know", I answered. "That's why I'm out of my mind -- then I don't have to face what's in there!"

"Well", barked Dog, "Sometimes you just have to face the music. What is essential for good putting is tuning up and down your mind and finding just the right song theme for that perfect putt.

"Oh", I said, "like 'Missing You' by the Rolling Stones; that's one of my favorites!"

Dog pawed the ground in disgust. "No!", he growled. "You'll do just what the song says and miss your putt --don't you see? Hum something like 'I Can't Take My Eyes off You'; then you'll have half a chance -- get it?!"

I got it, and every day now, I get down on my knees at the local pound and thank Dog for everything. His simple advice turned my putting game around. Here I am on hole 12 at Pulpit Rock. The polehole waited for me on that thin sliver of land between the pond on one side and the stream on the other. My tee shot has miraculously stayed dry, landing about fifteen feet from the basket. Full of confidence, I begin scanning my mind-dial for the right theme song for this crucial putt. "Splish, Splash, I was taking a bath..." suddenly blares out of my head.

"No, that won't do, I'm shaking enough already", I tell my mind. "How about something relaxing, soothing; some easy listening favorite to ease my disc right into the chains." My mind scans back and forth, pauses, and I hear garbled cuisinart bits of Englebert Humperdink, Barry Manilow, John Denver. But the worst is yet to come. I fixate on the grungy back beat of "Wild Thing" by the Trogs. My battered Aero leaps like "Freebird" out of my trembling hands, and the polehole begins seductive undulations. Suddenly it's "Na na na na na na na na, hey hey, good-bye" playing. Splash! I'm taking a bath.

Proposed Disc Golf Rule Changes

Because of archaic and unfair Disc Golf rules, most Disc Golfers are unable to record a score that accurately reflects their true ability. With a few breaks and the following rule changes, which have been unofficially incorporated into all rounds played by Skylands Flying Disc Club members at the Buzzy's Creek course in West Milford, New Jersey, scores have become more realistic, thereby allowing for a more enjoyable Disc Golf experience.

- I. A player may throw as many tee shots off the first tee as is necessary to obtain a satisfactory result. Everyone recognizes that a good player needs to loosen up, but members of the plastic community are genetically pre-disposed to tardiness, have barely enough time to lace their footgear, and should therefore not be penalized for unpreparedness beyond their control.
- II. A disc thrown into an unplayable or out-of-bounds area may be placed in the fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into that area. Such veering right or left frequently results from friction between the palm of the hand and the edge of the disc. Players should not be penalized for erratic behavior of the disc resulting from such uncontrollable physical phenomena.
- III. A disc hitting a tree shall be deemed not to have hit the tree. Hitting a tree is simply a matter of bad luck and has no place in a scientific game. The player should estimate the distance the disc would have traveled had it not hit the tree, and play the disc from the nicest available throwing position.
- IV. A disc that has its flight path suddenly diverted by a gust of wind may be placed at the theoretical landing spot had these meteorological conditions not occurred. It is a known fact that excessive dependence upon higher fluorocarbons, in association with atmospheric pollution wrought by war-related Kuwaiti oil fires, has permanently altered our planet's ozone layer. That gust of wind is most likely the result of this damage. Global weather changes should not be a concern of Disc Golfers, and we should therefore not be penalized when our flight paths are altered.
- V. There shall be no such thing as a lost disc. The missing disc is on or near the course somewhere and eventually will be found and claimed by someone else. It thus becomes a stolen disc, and the player should not compound the felony by charging him/herself with a penalty stroke.
- VI. Even in the case of a disc seemingly disappearing into a water hazard, keep in mind that sometime in the not too distant past or future, this water hazard may have been or may become dry land, in which case the disc wasn't even in a penalty area to begin with. We should not be allowed to think we can play the game with a total disregard for geological evolution. No penalty for a water grave.

VII. When playing a shot from a horrendously difficult position (e.g. heavy brush or jungle-like growth), a disc which remains in a poor location may be rethrown as many times as is necessary in order to extricate oneself from this precarious position, without any extra strokes being recorded. It is only reasonable to assume that the shot could have been executed properly on the initial attempt if the player had time to concentrate on his/her shot, instead of being concerned with hurrying so as not to delay playing partners, or being preoccupied with preparing a response to the laughter that might result from a poorly executed shot.

VIII. Current rules state that if a disc becomes lodged in a tree greater than two meters off the ground, a one-stroke penalty is incurred. Good players wouldn't throw discs into trees if they were allowed to concentrate on shot execution instead of stresses being placed on cranial processes from a foreign system of measurement that requires the use of a calculator or conversion chart. No penalty stroke for a disc stuck in a tree.

IX. A "mulligan", or re-throw, will be allowed whenever a shot is so poor that the only rational explanation for such a pitiful attempt is that the player must have suffered a sudden, acute seizure resulting from a dependence upon drugs or alcohol. The 1992 "Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA)" recognizes this dependence as a legitimate physical handicap, and those individuals must not be discriminated against. As athletes concerned with the "Spirit of the Game", and the wellness of our fellow competitors, it is only right that we have compassion for those with handicaps. Allow a rethrow with no penalty strokes incurred.

X. If a disc passes directly over the polehole target without dropping into the chains or the basket, it is deemed to have dropped. Newton's laws pertaining to gravity hold that any object attempting to maintain a position in the atmosphere without some form of support must drop. Laws of gravity supercede those of Disc Golf.

XI. If a disc comes to rest on the top of the polehole, or somehow hangs on the edge of the basket, your reaction may have been or may be, "No way...How can this be??". You're right. It can't be. Count it as in. Illusion or trickery has no place in Disc Golf.

XII. A disc that passes through the chains but doesn't stay in the basket counts as being in. A plastic disc parting metal chains violates all laws of physics. We must not defy the law.

XIII. A disc that stops close enough to the polehole to inspire such comments as "You could blow it in" may be blown in. This rule does not apply if the disc stops more than two disc widths from the polehole, because no one wants to make a travesty of the game.


New Permanent Course in Foxboro


