The tournament featured two rounds of disc golf on the narrow, wooded course, three-on-three basketball, and freestyle. The main attraction, however, was the new world record set for the best broccoli salad ever made.

Basketball featured five teams in a round-robin format, where ringers Jeff Bercume and Mark Gordon carried their teammate yours truly to victory. Several disc fanatics enthusiastically suggested that next year the basketball should be held on a different day. This seems reasonable; however, combining the two sports was at least a novel idea.

Todd Brodeur and Rick Williams, playing with different partners, sparkled in the unjudged freestyle competition. The show featured five teams of varying ability and sense of humor.

The big event of the day, however, was the two-round golf tournament on the infamous Pyramids course. In the first round, Dave Johnson show a remarkable eight under par to break the course record. His target-tracking discs slid through narrow windows as if charmed. His eyes took on the crazed look of a religious fanatic as he sank putts from all over and recorded nine birdies with one lone bogey. But then the forest started getting mad.

It began with a slow murmur from a big pine: "How dare this human needle us?" "He is making saps of us all!" barked a maple. The discontent branched out to the birches, the elms, the oaks. The laurel cackled its eerie laugh. The brush burned in shame. Even the lowly ferns vowed revenge.

The Accident at the 13th

The thirteenth hole of my golf course heads downhill and curves right along a path in the deep woods. The target is a thin wooden pole jutting out of an old telephone wire spool. The spool sits on a dam next to a pond on one side and a 20-foot dropoff on the other. It's a tricky throw, but not a long one; the target is 250 feet from the tee. You've got to keep your disc down and doglegging right. But even if you nail this arching window, watch out for the pond on the left; it's OB. Throw too far right and you're over the dam facing a 40-foot uphill putt. It's the classic New England disc golf hole: low and narrow, through the trees and treacherous. The favored discs here are Ultimate-like golf discs. You want a disc that floats rather than sails through the air, and plops rather than glides when it meets the ground. Either a Wham-O 71 on an Innova Apple will do the trick; my preferred weapon is the DGA Soft Approach.

When it left my hand, I knew it was good. I had that magic feeling where time stands still, as you watch your disc approach the target as if remote-controlled. It hit the middle of the wooden pole. The ace put me five under for 13 holes; the 14th would have to wait.

Not far from this hole sits a rusting pickup truck -- for all I know, it's still rusting there -- wearing a bumper sticker that tells the story far better than I ever could. "Frisbee Changed My Life," it says.

The Princeton Light / Heavy Experiment

On June 2, 1990, a dozen NEFAns gathered at the Theo Brown Memorial Disc Golf Course in Princeton, Massachusetts, to try some golf competition using different types of golf discs. "Light" plastic was defined as discs from the pre-beveled-edge era, or the basic Wham-O 165g, 141g, and 119g. "Heavy" plastic was anything goes, or the latest technology. We tried a mix, playing 18-holes heavy, 18-holes light, and then a final nine with alternating holes heavy and light.

The results after 45 holes found Judy Robbins atop the Women's division with a total of +3, besting Joy Hartwell with +8. Sunny Cade successfully rode the home course advantage to win the Open with a -10. Rick Williams came back big time on the final 9 with -5 to squeeze out 2nd place with a total of -7 over Steve Hartwell's -6. Todd Brodeur was on Steve's heels in 4th with -5 and Dale Fuller had -3 for 5th. Noteworthy performances on individual rounds were Judy Robbins' -4 with light plastic, and Bill MacWilliams -5 with heavy plastic. It was nice to see Mitch Hinard and newcomers Colin Brown of Boston and Felix from Providence, who did well in their first Princeton outing.

A splendid day was had by all, with the general feeling that though the experiment was interesting to try, the new technology is more fun, offering longer distance, more variety of shots, and more overall control of the game. Pot luck prizes and a NEFA board meeting finished up the day. Steve Hartwell donated a trophy sized mini-polehole as a travelling trophy for informal NEFA tournaments; he was pleased to present it to Sunny as the first victor. [Editor's note: Jason Southwick subsequently wrested the polehole away on June 30 with his victory at Pyramids.]
