




The States of Disc Golf

Keep in mind there is league play at a course in Massachusetts nearly every day of the week.




Maine NEFA News

Maine has seen another year of significant growth in 2006, with more courses, more tournaments and more players than ever before. The Maine Championship Series and Maine Points Race were bigger and more popular than in previous years, and nearly half of those events were also NEFA events. The Tournament of Champions finale was our best yet, despite the horrendous conditions (pouring rain and wind gusting over 40-45 mph). All the winners there truly earned the honor this year. In total, thirteen events comprised the 2006 Maine Series and overall Series attendance was up by nearly 50% over 2005. Every event is back on board and ready to go for 2007.

In 2007, there will be two new additions to the Maine tournament scene: the Doubles Series and the Team Challenge series. The Doubles Series will be open to any doubles tournament that wants to take part, and will award points to individuals based on their finish at each tournament. At the end of the year, the top four players in each division will be paired off together and will play off in a best of three match-play final in October.

The Team Challenge series, concocted by Howard Burnham of Woodland Valley Disc Golf and Bob Enman of Enman Field and Dragan Field Disc Golf, will pit various six-person teams against one another in two rounds of doubles once a month. Up to 15 teams can attend any individual event, with the best cumulative team score at each event winning the traveling trophy and bragging rights for the month. The schedule of Challenge events can be found on www.mainediscgolf.com. Any course interested in hosting a challenge should feel free to volunteer because the dates are set, but the listed host courses are more than willing to give up a few of their dates to increase the variety of the series. With these new additions, the 2007 disc golf scene in Maine is going to be fun and competitive. Can't wait to get started!

I also hate my therapist, and I'd like to punch him in the face, throw his computer through the window... Stop at four beers, no big deal. Finally post my mind at PDGA.com. I've been TOO good is what it is. There's a little wear at the corners of the disc golf bag, and the strap is holding by an unravelling string.

Do you often feel overly active and compelled to do things, like you were driven by a motor?

I just laugh. "Everybody I know would have the same answers. Everybody is like that," I say, unconvincingly

And he says, big dooshbag that he is, "Birds of a feather..." We clarify the issue as it sinks in. My little world of all frisbee players, as different as we are we're somewhere inside us the same. The frisbee gene.


“Are you driven, like a motor, to run several disc golf tournaments a year?”

Woods at Beauty Hill

My daughter, when asked, "What is life all about?" answered, "It's about stories." I like that sentiment and thought I'd like to tell you the story of how we came to build The Woods At Beauty Hill Disc Golf Course. I have been living at the top of Beauty Hill in Barnstead, New Hampshire for over a dozen years. It is a lovely 85-acre farm with an old 18th century farmhouse and a big unattached New Hampshire barn. We have numerous out buildings, like the sugar shack, (which have been used for various animals and farm activities throughout the years) a field of hay, meadows and woods.




In 2004, through a variety of personal circumstances, I found myself away from home all of the daylight hours and several evenings as well. I began to look for other options. If I sold the farm, I knew the chances were good it would be developed and I didn't want to see that happen. At the same time, I did not think it was fair to keep all this for myself and not share it with others. It just didn't seem right for one person to own so much and not put it to good use (that's the yankee in me.) I felt I should do some-

thing with the land to at least pay the taxes and keep the place in good repair. I thought for a long time about some things I could do that wouldn't compromise my integrity.

This leads to another milestone in my story. I am fortunate to have the best job in the world; I am the Chichester Town Librarian. As such, I meet the most interesting people, one of whom was Blaze Konefal. Blaze and his wife, Dawn, are the owners of Crazy Maze: a portable maze that travels to parks and fairs all over New England. Blaze has great ideas for all kinds of science type activities and we eventually got together to discuss some ideas, one of which was to cut a maze through my hayfield. We opened this to the public and added some other attractions: one of which was a Frisbee Golf Course.

Our sign on Route 28, advertising our Maze and Frisbee golf Course, brought a lot of interest from the real disc golfers in the area. I am sure they were terribly disappointed when they saw our hula-hoops and large Frisbees, but they were gracious and encouraging and tried to convince me how this farm would be a great place for a professional disc golf course. They told me "If I built it they would come." Several of them laid out a course for us on the spot. It was fun and I found myself really liking disc golfers.



So, being the intelligent entrepreneurial type that I am, I started to research disc golf. It sounded like fun. Disc Golf even fit with my philosophy of saving the land combined with wise use management. I wanted to share this beautiful place with others and help people understand the value of keeping open space for wildlife habitat and ecosystem stability. I began to see a glimmer of how disc golf could possibly help with providing food and shelter for my family, and who knows; maybe I'd even get decent retirement account in time.

I appreciate how disc golf is a sport almost anyone can play; it is a good walk for people who need to exercise. I saw how disc golf is a great sport for kids because unlike football or soccer, this is a lifetime sport. I also discovered how courses throughout the world have tournaments and envisioned offering great prizes to get the kids motivated to play right here in New Hampshire where so few have even heard of disc golf. I know very little about hosting tournaments, but what the heck, I can learn....right?

By the middle of July 2005, the plan was in place, but we knew the course wouldn't be completely installed until 2006. Volunteer disc golfers laid out a course for us and in doing so, their passion was evident. I loved the enthusiasm of these folks. Blaze worked all winter and into the spring installing the course while using some of the ideas suggested by fellow disc golfers. We finished cutting brush and small trees to the point where the pine forest looked like a scene from the movie Narnia. Finally, we got our web site up and going: WoodsAtBeautyHill.com. We officially opened June 1 2006.

It is now the end of October 2006. We have completed our first season and I must say I have never experienced such a level of support and good will. Right from the beginning, the four volunteers who became my first members also became my main support network. Doug Betchel was able to use his connections to get us an article in the Concord Monitor. John Kilpatrick designed and put up flyers in Dover, Durham and in the seacoast where most of the disc golfers that use the course are from at the present. Nik Groleau and Eric built a kiosk and Eric continues to advise me on any mechanical problems I have with my old tractor. None of this would have happened if it weren't for Blaze, who has such innovative ideas as well as the ability to carry them out. He has helped to distinguish our course by designing beautiful tees and staircases. I say "our course" now because it is not just mine anymore. Through word of mouth and advertising, the local disc golfers have found out about us, and they eventually figured out they could play here anytime if they ask permission. Because the hours of operation for the public are limited at the present, an honor box has been built. Disc golfers seem to be people of quality and I have enjoyed getting to know many of you interesting folks.

From the beginning, I kept hearing all about the tournaments. When the subject was brought up however, I'd think to myself, "How am I going to do this?" You see, I come from a long line of partiers, (Italians think nothing of having the whole extended family of 125 strong over for Christmas Eve dinner). So, I am aware of the incredible amount of preparation it takes to do a good tournament. The answer to my questions came in July 06 when Nik asked me if we could have an Ace Race Tournament sponsored by Discraft. He went on to tell me about Discraft and how they were offering a two-disc player package with a hat and a mini disc. Nik explained how it is a unique tournament because you only throw the single Discraft prototype disc and you throw for aces. Much to my relief, Nik agreed to handle all the details of the tournament.

Everything continued to fall into place. When preparing for the tournament, John had an idea that we should provide a homemade meal. Since we weren't getting a huge response (30 or 40 is a small party where I come from), I knew I could handle it. With the help of Dawn, John, his mom, and Nik, it was easy and fun. We had a rainy day, but that just added to the memorable experience. Nik did an awesome



job with the Ace Race Tournament and he's going to do it again next year.

Some details about the course: Par is 59 from the advanced tees and the course record is 49. Total course length from advanced tees is 6,150 ft. Other amenities on site include a practice basket and net, port a pottie, picnic tables, ample parking and scorecards with maps. Tee signs feature painted layouts of each hole as well as distance/elevation details. Loaner discs are available as well as cold drinks and snacks. Plans for the future include a small retail store in 2007. Be sure to check out the website for more details and directions: www.WoodsAtBeautyHill.com

Disc in Devens - A Report

Devens Disc Golf Course at Shepley's Hill is Massachusetts's newest course and is as challenging as it is beautiful. Conveniently located just off I-495 and Rt 2 in Devens, MA (about 30 minutes northeast of Worcester), the course offers tightly wooded fairways, beautiful rock formations, tons of elevation, and some pretty dangerous putting. The course should develop nicely as players from Eastern and Central MA and Southern NH discover yet another course closer to home.

Getting Things Started

Brian McNulty and I have been working on this project for just under two years. Even though we starting clearing Hole 1 in April '06, it took us about a year to even get permission to start building the course. It has been an exercise in patience, that's for sure. Since Devens is in the process of becoming a town (it used to be a military base) and is currently run by a State agency, it has taken a while to meet with the right people, get decisions made, and get permission granted. Recently retired Devens Recreation Director Kathy Wiberg has been our biggest supporter on Devens, and we appreciate all the support and guidance she gave us.

Early in 2005, Brian got things going by approaching Devens officials about installing a course somewhere on the base. He asked a friend to post a message on the NEFA boards and that's when I got involved. After several meetings spread over several months, we were offered about 30 acres of rocky, hilly, and otherwise unusable designated open space. We said, "Excellent. We'll take it!"

We agreed that since Brian lived on Devens, he should continue to be our inside man, getting the word out and working with town officials. He also volunteered to be in




charge of fundraising and has been kicking butt with that. The guy is relentless!

While Brian got things rolling on his end, I built some temporary bucket targets from a design I received from Pete Tolvanen. From there, I started to design and lay out the course during pretty much every waking moment. I went over to the Hill several times over the winter to scope out the land and get a feel for it and was overwhelmed by the beauty of all the exposed boulders, ledges, and trees. I decided to take advantage of as many natural features as possible and I must say that it is turning into a really beautiful course.

Promoting the Course

To let the community know what we were doing, we contacted the local newspapers and were interviewed for a few articles. We also put on demos at two Devens community events, posted flyers, held a Wednesday Weekly, and currently have an ad running on the local public access channel. I have also been updating the NEFA discussion board and our blog (devensdiscgolf.blogspot.com).



“I Like To Cut Things!”

Since we officially got permission to start construction in April, a small crew of dedicated volunteers has faithfully showed up for workdays. Thanks very much to everyone who has helped at one time or another, but special thanks must go to Rob Walker, Dave James, Steve Berthiaume, “Mr. Implements of Destruction” TM Dyer, and my trusty bow saw. With the exception of TM’s two marathon days wielding a chainsaw and brush hog, 95% of the work has been done by hand. Maybe I’m demented, but there’s something about doing it the old-fashioned way that makes it seem more worthwhile, especially when you’re sitting in the middle of the woods on a beautiful day and you see a deer run by. I’d also like to thank Dean Withrow and the Borderland Disc Golf

Committee for loaning us four baskets, as well as those companies and individuals who have already contributed to the course.

So What’s the Course Like?

Well, it ain’t called Shepley’s Hill for nothing. While we tried to design fun and challenging holes for all skill levels, the fact is that you are going to have to go back up the Hill eventually. The course starts off with an open fairway that abruptly ends at the woods’ edge, hinting at what is to come. Most of the front nine is fairly level except for Hole 3 which is a long, downhill bomb that dog-legs left up a hill to the top of some huge boulders. The back nine has a few downhill finesse shots that require a putter or midrange off the tee and then a dangerous downhill putt. Hole 14 is an impressive-looking monster that takes you pretty much all the way back up to the top of the Hill.

Several holes require good course management if you want a chance at par. Hole 18 is like that, offering a wide landing zone for your approach, but also tempting you to huck one hard past the LZ, over the ridge, and down the hill. There are at least two legitimate ace runs and a good mix of left, right, straight, up, and down holes. There is casual water after it rains and during the spring melt, but otherwise no water (yet). Big arms will probably use only mid-range discs and putters, while the rest of us will use a few drivers on some of the longer holes.



What’s Coming Up?

Barring any early snow, we should have at least five (possibly 14) baskets installed by the end of December. In any case, keep your eyes open for our first tournament this winter. It should be a good time! Initial feedback from local top pros and amateurs has been excellent, encouraging, and definitely appreciated. It’s time you came out and saw for yourself, no? Have you played the Hill today?

Hero-ic Accomplishment

After hearing so much positive feedback about the place called “Heroes” I had to check it out for myself and meet the man behind the disc golf course. Ted Cormier (also known as Hero) built his own “Fortress of Solitude” on 30 + acres of rolling hills and former cow pastures in picturesque West Granby, CT. The course is half rolling meadow and half wooded, replete with meandering streams, beautiful sloping landscapes and even a small pond that makes for a challenging water hazard hole.

Hero was first introduced to the sport of disc golf by his longtime friend Bill “Red” Stewart (of Pye Brook DGC fame). From 1983 to 1985, both attended Clark University in Worcester where Hero was in grad school and Stewie was an undergrad working as a bartender at a bar called Mike’s Blarney Stone. On a night when the bar was filled to the brim with underclassmen, Hero, in a desperate attempt to gain the Stew’s attention for a pitcher of beer, waved a \$20 over the heads of the crowded masses and shouted, “Hey Red, got a \$20 spot for ya if I can get a pitcher!!” As Hero described, “Red got his \$20 spot, I got quenched and we’ve been like brothers ever since”.


During their free time at Clark, the two played a 27-hole object course on the grounds of the university, though Hero had yet to play on a real disc golf course. On Stew’s birthday in the summer of 2003, they headed out to play Amesbury Park and the newly created Pye Brook DGC in Topsfield, MA.

Armed with his only disc at the time (a 175g Ultimate lid from back in his college Frisbee flippin days), Hero became smitten with the sport. He researched and studied throwing styles, disc types, and overall course design protocols. Using existing old cross- country ski trails and farm roads



on his property, Hero created a series of temporary loops with homemade targets. Roughly one year later, he had his first design in place with an established flow. In 2004, he purchased 18 targets made of PVC pipe and netting and though visually effective, the targets were by no means permanent.

By 2005, after gathering a great deal of valuable information in regards to course design as well as effective throwing styles, Hero began to implement an 18-hole layout complete with DB-5 baskets and tee boxes. Next on the agenda was the extensive removal of brush, tree cutting and the unenviable, often times bloody task of removing an extensive network of burberry that left untended over the years enveloped the edges of the old cow pasture and farm roads. With a rough 18- hole layout in place, the only thing left to do was get the word out.



Stew suggested that a tournament would be the most effective way to advertise the course, and thus Heroes’ “Wild Turkey Flip—Out” was born in November of 2005. Stew was able to find the perfect trophy on e-Bay.

Although turnout was small by most tournament standards, those who attended would grow to become course regulars who readily offer their assistance for workdays and input for improvements. Several players from Wickham Park played the course regularly, including Jesse Carrieri, Stephen Ditter, Chris Webb and Mike Chipchase. Hero made up scorecards for use during casual rounds and kept the results for the purposes of tweaking tee box and pole hole locations by using average hole by hole results.

Hero found new inspiration after a four day disc golf tour of Southern California with Reese Swinea from Fly 18. “I realized that the definition of challenging was to create a course that was less punishing overall, but rewards aggressive play, with finesse as the great equalizer”—Hero told me. Using turned in scorecards as a basis; he developed handicaps of 31.2 for the front 9 and 31.5 for the back 9 with an overall par of 58. With

the layout in place, the reviews from locals and outsiders alike were very positive.

In 2006, Hero's DGC was designated as the official starting point for the all day/night annual cult tournament known as the LiCk-A-tHoN. What does the future hold for this relatively new course? Plans are already in the works for an additional 9 holes, bringing the total to 27, as well as a second set of tees per hole. The course record is 51, shot by Mitch Sonderfan (this may have changed since this article was written). Most recently, Heroes was officially designated as the winter home course of the "Wickites" for the Team Challenge.

If an individual wishes to sponsor a particular hole, \$200 will get you a lifetime membership at Heroes. Each hole will be hero-themed – named after a favorite hero of the sponsor. Additionally, a tournament sponsorship is \$200. Some course particulars: All fences, yellow ropes, streams and ponds on the course are OB and some areas



of thick meadow vegetation are lateral hazards costing a stroke. New wooden signs are a recent addition, as are new scorecards.

In all, I played 2 rounds with Hero on his course that day and to say that I was impressed would be a gross understatement. Hero told me that it was only the 4th time he had played the course that month. I found this hard to believe, but my skepticism was soon quelled when he informed me that most, if not all of his satisfaction comes from building and constantly improving the course versus playing solo rounds. Player feedback and input are essential to him. For a player to say upon finishing up a round, "Man, that was a fun and challenging course" is music to Hero's ears. Hero's Disc Golf Course (HDGC) is truly a triumphant accomplishment and should be on everyone's list of must-see courses. Because the course is on his private property, advanced notice of attendance is required. So send a quick cheerio to Hero and "Heave some High Horkin' Heat" with the man behind the course!

Building Cross Farms DGC

In the summer of 2005, Dave Mourad was contacted by Tom Ainsworth of Tolland Parks and Rec. The town was considering putting in a disc golf course at the new Cross Farms Recreation complex. Dave called me about this and from there the project was born.

Using our experience from the design and build out of the Wickham Park course, a small team of designers was picked to walk the land at Cross Farms. The initial walk through and design was done by Dave Mourad, myself, David Wollner and Mike Chipchase. The land given to us for the course was mostly wooded, with a small piece of field to work with. Not the greatest land for a course but not bad either. There was definitely potential. The town showed interest in funding 9 holes with all of the amenities or possibly 12 holes with fewer amenities. The designers kept all of this in mind as they walked the land. After weighing several possible course layouts the designers decided that an 18 hole course would make best use of the land.

Dave and I met with Parks and Recreation Dept. to walk the designed course. We successfully talked them into going for an 18 hole course with the proviso that if we worked to raise money for the additional 6 baskets, they would buy 12 baskets. With all this decided, Dave asked me to be the course contact and to take over as the leader on this project. I started writing often on the NEFA course thread to establish interest and to provide a point of contact to get this project underway. I made a plea for donations for this course on the thread, but ultimately, it was the generous donations of a select few people that made this come together. Most of it was funded by a group some know as the Archers. NEFA auction funds kicked in for a basket – Thank You!

As the 2006 season approached, I was informed by the town that they had purchased all 18 of the baskets and were anxious to get them in the ground. The designers were reduced to fewer people pretty quick, with me and David Wollner becoming the mainstay of the group. We set out to flag the course for tee, pin and fairway shape. Trees to be removed were taped

off with fluorescent colored streamers. We instructed the town to come in and take down the larger taped trees and to remove brush.

We had a workday that was attended by a few really hearty individuals who braved a cold rain that turned to snow for awhile. Brush and small trees were removed on the front nine. Later David returned by himself to clear more small trees and brush. The basic layout was worked on further by us as well as others who contributed from time to time to help get the course ready for baskets. The town came and took some of the larger trees down and then put in the baskets over one weekend.



We started playing the course immediately. We realized right away that a lot more clearing of debris would be necessary. A lot of trimming would be needed to make the course playable as well; however, we were determined to not take too much away as this would make the course too easy after awhile. David and I set out to work on a minimum of at least one hole per playing day, to trim and clean the fairway and pin areas. We got regular help from a few of our playing buddies each week. I would like to personally thank

those folks that helped out; you know who you are, and your efforts are truly appreciated.

There were some “helpers”, that didn’t do the course justice. These individuals took it upon themselves to “modify” the course to make it easier to play and in the process of doing so, the course design was harmed. Since this occurred, we decided that we would have to make some holes longer and harder to compensate for the damage done. The majority of the lengthened holes are located on the back nine. The course definitely played harder after awhile. There were some initial grumblings over the changes made, but most of it was quieted as people played the course more and adjusted their games accordingly.

The town said that they would put in some form of tee pad this year and pushed us to get the tees set so that they could install them. We recom-

mended Fly pads and the town seemed to show some interest in using them. David and I hustled to get the course set and the tee pads flagged appropriately so fly pads could be installed correctly.

Once we gave the town the go ahead, we thought they would have the Fly pads installed in short order. The town installed a rubber mat tee pad on hole 1 as an experiment. They then excavated tee pad sites at holes 2-4 and filled each halfway with stone dust. From there, the job just stopped. Our tee pad job was reduced in priority and subsequently fell to “a low man on the totem pole” status for the rest of the summer.

As the season moved through, the latest word I got was that the town decided to go with concrete tee pads because of cost. I agreed at the time and instructed them on the correct way to install them. Nothing further ever came of this. I made a case later in the season to go back to the original Fly pad idea for tee pads. The rationale is that these could be moved if the course saw too much wear and tear. I suggested a fundraiser might work to bring in Fly pads; however, I have yet to receive a yea or nay on this.

Directional signs for tee locations were made out of scrap wood. My wife had crafted a number of wooden folk art roosters for her garden club plant sale. Since we still had a good amount of these that went unsold, she and I decided that wooden roosters would make good temporary tee signs. I put numbers, distances and a small fairway indicator on each one. We installed the tee signs over the period of a couple of outings. I also purchased a small wall mount mailbox and hung it on a tree at hole 1. I made up some quickie maps/scorecards to go in the mailbox and they went fast. I’m currently working on a finalized map and scorecard for the course that I’m hoping the town will provide printing services for.

Currently, we feel that the course is playing fairly well. It is our intention to finalize the course by finishing off the tee boxes in a more permanent fashion. A workday in November should have us leveling out and putting permanent lines in the tee boxes. Following that is our first tournament just after Thanksgiving on November 25. I am proud to officially announce that the course is finished and ready for all to play. We see potential in the coming years for other areas of the woods to be tapped for 9 to 18 more holes. We also hope to be able to offer regular league play as well



as more tournaments in the upcoming season. The course is definitely a hit with the locals and others from the area including UConn students. It also gives displaced off-season Wickites a place to play.

The course at Cross Farms has been a real labor of love for me, David and a select few others. I now understand the trials and tribulations that course designers before me had to endure. Dealing with litterbugs just goes with the territory. Bugs, sweat, cuts, bruises, chainsaws, loppers, etc., are the realities behind the lives of the course builders. Those that come and slam the course or show disdain for the layout without having put real hard work in, have no clue how much the designers/builders give for the sport of others. By building this course, it is our hope to further promote the sport we all love so much as well as provide a regular home course to play, and enjoy the friendship and competition of others. We have a great thing going here as long as all of us understand that places like this will only be here for us if we respect the land and take care of the course. Please feel free to get involved in caring for your local disc golf course.

The Cross Farms Recreation Complex is located minutes from I-84 in Tolland, CT. Take exit 68 east to the first major intersection. Take a left onto Rhoades Rd. Follow approx. 1 mi. Cross Farms is on the left. Drive to the last parking area. The course starts up the hill to the left of the fenced in field. No Fees, No accommodations. 
