The first topic I would like to throw out is a personal pet peeve of mine. And it was the survey included in a recent issue of *Disc Golfer* that sparked me into conceiving this idea and article.

But first a preliminary overview of the topic at hand. 1-Do you believe that Disc Golf will grow and develop best if we seek to adopt traditional golf's attitude. In other words, will a rule requiring pros wear a collared shirt improve Disc Golf's professionalism and encourage more serious media coverage,

ultimately improving awareness of the sport as a whole? A tournament in Virginia already has this requirement. Or would banning all smoking during tournaments enable more players to compete in these events, also increasing active membership? These are the very questions posed in that last survey mentioned above. And these are blatantly representative of the types of rules that are slowly insulating themselves into our rulebook. And your answers to questions like these, or your opinions on existing rules, like the penalty assessed for each unlabeled disc in any player's bag, will enable you to honestly address this issue's question:

Do you believe we the PDGA should concentrate our efforts on introducing new, and stepping up enforcement of existing, rules? Or should we leave well enough alone and permit a little, simple politeness and responsibility assert their just authority to fill in the gaps left in any rational rules structure? Using a previous example, should we simply ban all smoking of any kind in any PDGA sanctioned tournaments or express the fact that blowing smoke in someone's face while they're putting is rude, but a quietly smoked cigarette while walking to a disc is okay. I mean do rules such as this somehow establish us? .Do they make for greater enjoyment of the game and therefore more players who compete in tournaments? Do

we respect, or more importantly enjoy ball golf's many, many rules and regulations? And do we wish to consciously direct our sport's evolvement in this direction? I mean, heck, if I gack a 4 meter putt while an opponent is whispering gibberish to somebody near the next tee should I slap them with a penalty stroke? Personally speaking, I find a little more practice and better concentration would help me deal with such errors better than tighter rules.

Thus I blend semi-informative content with utterly biased opinion. Regardless of your opinion on this topic I would greatly appreciate any communication.

In the meantime stay hard and healthy.


NEFA Board Meeting Minutes for August 3, 1994






DDC Tips

Offense

- Work on timing.
- Throw discs so they land at the same time.
- Discover opponents weaknesses.
- Keep opponents deep in the court.
- Aim for the middle of the court.

Defense

- Tipping or milking (waiting as long as possible before catching) is the way to escape being doubled.
- The back person (the player catching the 1st disc) must look at both discs coming in and call "tipping" or "go".
- If the call is "tipping", the front person must wait until he hears the tip before he catches. Once he hears the tip he must catch and throw quickly and call "off".
- If the call is "go", the front must get to the disc and throw as quickly as possible and call "off".
- When tipping, call it first and try to tip high to give your partner enough time to get rid of the other disc. Also get into position to catch the tip. The call may be "Tipping now, 2, 1, catch".
- The back person cannot catch the tip until he hears the "off" call.
- The front person must tell the back when the second disc is being thrown by calling "coming fast" or "coming slow... 2, 1"
- If a disc is dropped or goes OB or a tip is not going to be caught the call is "hold".

Professional vs. Amateur

There is a strange anomaly in disc sports that I personally don't understand. It is this thing between amateur and professional. There is this thinking that seems to pervade this sport that these two terms refer to a skill level. I am going to refer to the dictionary as to the definitions of these two words and there particular uses.

Professional [adj.] 1. Of, related to, engaged in, or suitable for a profession. 2. Engaged in a specific activity as a source of livelihood. 3. Performed by persons receiving pay.

Amateur [n.] 1. A person who engages in any art, science, study, or athletic activity as a past time rather than as a profession. 2. An athlete who has never participated in competition for money or a livelihood.

Certainly in most cases the professional player of a given sport is of a higher skill level than that of an amateur in the same field but this is not always the case. The Olympics was once reserved only for amateur athletes and they were impressive athletes in their chosen fields. This has changed recently and the Olym-

pic games now allow professional athletes to compete. Some sports have no professional realm within which a player could compete or play for cash rewards. Since the word professional is a derivative of the word profession which is really another word for a job, something that you get paid to do. I feel that this is not a good marker of skill levels especially in disc sports where there is little doubt that even the top professional players are really able to support themselves solely with the monies that they earn playing disc sports.

At least in the realm of disc golf they try to differentiate the players with varying divisions that are supposed to be made up of players of the same skill levels. In the years that I have been reading about the various problems with "sandbaggers" people who have more skill than the other people in their division and should move up to the next division and either won't or don't because they cannot afford the entry fees of the pro division or that they may not have the necessary skills to compete in that realm and place in the money. Where we




A View from ALOFT

are in the infancy of this sport and most of the purse monies that are available to win are generated from the players entry fees. I'm not sure that it is really all that fair to force someone who is winning in the "Amateur Division" to turn "Professional".

The New England Flying disc Association is an amateur organization with a novice division open to first year players, there is an intermediate division for players of more skill and possibly there should be an advanced division, and then there is an open division that even if you are a professional player on the national circuit you may compete in this division. Some of the open players in our organization play in the amateur divisions when they play in the bigger tournaments in other parts of the country and they should not feel that because they play in the open division here that they should play with the professionals there. This thinking should be applied to all the aspects of disc sports just because you are an expert freestyler doesn't mean that you automatically play in the open division in golf and vise versa. The different aspects of disc sports should have varying divisions for the individual to choose from where they might be able to compete against someone of there own ability level in a given discipline.

In view of the fact that professional and amateur are not skill levels of themselves, a solution might be to have three divisions within the pros. A-rated players being the best pros, B-rated being mid level pros and Crated being the least skilled pros. In the amateur realm I think there should be 4 divisions. Open, Advanced, Intermediate, and Novice. With these types of divisions it should be possible for players to compete with others of their own abilities. Doing this will spread the purses over a greater number of players and will hopefully reduce the "sandbagging" effect that seems to be a problem. If a pro were to complete in an amateur event they would be playing in the open division and I think that the other divisions are self explanatory, letting players decide where they best fit into the whole scheme of things. By dividing the pros into three divisions you should have a bigger field of players willing to play as a pro and not just kicking in cash for the best players to win.
