

I got a phone call from Stork one week after moving to Princeton, Mass. in 1986. "You won't believe this story, Sunny. I just got off the phone with a guy named Bob Dral who called me several months ago about inventing "Beer Bottle Frisbee®". I suggested he copyright it and call me back. He did." Bob and his friend Marshall were on a camping trip. Marshall and Bob were sitting approximately 30 feet apart with their beer bottles on the ground beside them. Marshall threw a disc and knocked over Bob's bottle. Bob returned the favor. From that experience, a game, much like horse shoes evolved, with a scoring system, a yearly world championship at "Bob's Bowlarama" in his basement, world champ tee shirts and a champaign bath to the winner of this day long extravaganza elimination tournament which had 15 or so aficionados for about a decade.

Bob asked Stork if there might be anyone close who would be interested in the game. "I live in a

small town you've probably never heard of, Princeton, Massachusetts." Replies Stork, "Of the perhaps 5 people on the planet most interested in game theory and flying disc play, Sunny Cade just moved to Princeton a week ago."

I played in the last 2 World Beer Bottle Championships – did not win – and together Bob and I formed the CMFA, Central Massachusetts Frisbee® Association. We set the goal for an umbrella organization to form itself over us.

In a disc golf gathering at my house around 1988, on the home course Bob had helped me build, I still can remember Edwin "Stick" Dissosway, sitting on the couch between DJ (Dave Johnson) and our first NEFA president Steve Hartwell, saying we need a New England disc organization. Greg Black and Rick Williams were there too. We drew up some agreements and the rest is NEFA history.

Fifth went to Rick Williams & Alan Caplin with the last place in the finals going to the Florida team of Paul Kenny & Dan Berman with a nice routine using a mission impossible motif.

## Jason Southwick Is Spreading It

How many of you know who Jason Southwick is? Raise your hand. Okay, those with hands up, leave the room and don't read this article. His reputation has already been branded into your memory cells, and nothing I say will change it. Those who don't know Jason just might have a chance to form a different opinion of him. This article will help. Please read it before meeting him in person, or my efforts here will be futile.

At the Vermont State Flying Disc Championships, Jason organized the Accuracy event. He set up the Accuracy stations with some homemade devices. The devices were crude, consisting of flimsy cardboard, some rope, spray paint, and a five-foot long stick, stole...I mean recycled from what looked like a window frame. Yes, the stuff was crude, but it was precise and, most important, it got the job done (and done quickly!). I was impressed. Jason spent time and money thinking, buying, and methodically creating a template and a way to set up an Accuracy layout quickly. This was no small task.

What inspired him to do all this, he tells me in his usual quiet and humble manner, was his experience at the Masters World Flying Disc Championships, held on the south side of Boston in July. He had volunteered to coordinate the Accuracy event for the tournament, having minimal experience at doing such a job at this level of competition. With input from tournament veterans he learned what it takes to do a good job, and he ran a successful Accuracy event.

After the World Championships, he set about designing an Accuracy set-up. After creating the template and other goodies, Jason *had* to use the stuff. Why clutter up the living room with it? With no tournaments in the near future requiring his skills and equipment, he took the stuff to an Ultimate game. There he set up Accuracy and challenged players to "take their best shot". Ultimate players love a challenge. Especially getting out of bed Monday morning after a weekend tournament. The Ultimate hot shots were amazed at how difficult hitting a gaping 1.5 meter square target really is. But they liked the challenge and wanted to do the event again. They were hooked! They even asked about playing a few holes of disc golf.

After hearing this story, I thought *this* is the way to get more people into 'the other' disc sports. The method is devious and subtle...elements totally foreign to Jason. Basically, if you can't get people to a tournament, bring the tournament to the people! Ultimate players (and there are a lot of them in the Boston area) are perfect for recruiting for disc golf, double disc court, discathons, and the other disc sports we NEFA folks do. They just don't know how much fun these events are. You can tell them how much fun they are, and remind them "You can't play Ultimate forever", but they won't listen. Remember they love a challenge, and playing Ultimate into their eighties is part of the challenge. Jason has found the answer. By allowing Ultimate players to try an event like Accuracy, he gets their attention. Pretty soon they want more (I wonder if Jason has

previously used these insidious techniques?). Eventually constant exposure will cause these Ultimate players to ask where this crazy game is played. Welcome to NEFA. NEFA provides lots of opportunity to play Accuracy, as well as Disc Golf, Discathon, Double Disc Court, Freestyle, Maximum Time Aloft, and Distance.

I'm proud to say Jason is an asset to disc sports and to NEFA. He has found an effective way to spread the word about 'the other' disc sports. Disc sports that truly are lifelong. Performing flying disc shows for schools, town fairs, etc. is good exposure for the sport, but getting people to try something like Accuracy not once, but several times, is the way to spread the word. This I believe will get people interested and involved in disc sports, and hopefully join NEFA.

## SUMMER ULTIMATE CAMP

We recently held our first ultimate camp for boys and girls ages 9-1. It was sponsored by our local rec department, Amherst Leisure Services, and it ran for a week, every morning from 9 a.m.-noon. The camp was part of their sports camps program, which traditionally offers basketball, baseball, soccer, softball and other mainstream sports. I didn't have to do much administrative work at all; Leisure Services took care of all the paper work and I hired four counselors and planned the activities. On Monday morning, July 15, thirty-nine campers, who had paid about eighty dollars for the week, showed up to learn the basics of ultimate.

Each camper received an ultimate camp t-shirt and an Ultrastar. We started each day with throwing instruction. The counselors, past and present members of the ARHS ultimate teams, circulated among the campers while we waited for everyone to arrive. They asked questions such as, "Who needs help with their forehand?" and "Who wants to practice their

hucks?" Then we circled up for stretching, announcements and the plan for the day.

We spent the next forty-five minutes on instruction and drills. On Monday, we introduced throws/catches, faking/pivoting and the stack. On Tuesday, we showed the basics of one-on-one defense and cutting. Wednesday was zone day and reading the disc. In addition, each day one of the counselors would go over two or three rules. We didn't want to overwhelm them with technicalities but it was important for them to be introduced to the concept of self-officiating. The last hour and a half of camp each day was dedicated to scrimmaging. Monday's games looked predictably chaotic but by Friday they were all playing something that resembled ultimate. We divided the players into teams for Tuesday through Thursday and each counselor was responsible for about ten kids. The counselors, in essence, became their coaches for three days and learned quickly what each player needed to work on.

We held a mini-tournament on Thursday and a hat tournament on Friday. One of our goals was to

provide different competitive opportunities for every player; we didn't want anyone to go home at the end of the week and see themselves as "losers." They enjoyed the competition on Thursday but they also liked the silly contests throughout the week. We held an accuracy and distance contest as well as a pole-hole game in which everyone throws a disc into the pole-hole at the same time. We also had a crazy shorts and crazy shirt day. It was, after all, summer camp.

At the end of Friday, we held a short closing ceremony where we passed out prizes and certificates of participation. Each counselor also prepared an "Ultimate Camper Evaluation" in which a camper is rated in twenty categories, such as jumping ability, spirit, zone offense, and conditioning. We gave them specific suggestions for improvement as well as an evaluation sheet where they had a

chance to tell us what they liked or didn't like about camp.

Four years ago I tried to hold this camp and less than ten kids signed up. Obviously ultimate has become more popular in Amherst, but only a fourth of the campers were the younger siblings of my players. The director of these sports camps was pleased with the turnout: "These are very impressive numbers for a first-year camp." Only basketball drew more kids.

These types of camps should work well in other communities. A general disc sports camp could succeed as well. It was one of the easiest and most rewarding teaching experiences I've had. If anyone is interested in trying such a camp, I'd be happy to give you more details. Next year we're offering at least two weeks in a row, due to popular demand by both the campers and the staff.

## How "Captain Snap" Got His Name

Of the many great pleasures for me in the 96 Masters was playing golf with legendary Michael "Captain Snap" Conger. He impressed me no end with his positive attitude, when upon lodging his drive above 2 meters in a tree, he said in honest appreciation, it was a beautiful flight 'til that point. During the round he relayed to Royce Racinowski and me the origin of his fancy disc moniker. I relay it to you here as best I can recall it.

Back in '75 or '76, Victor Malefronte and I were in a contest before ABC Sports to break the world distance record. Tom Wingo was hanging around. After a few throws the ABC sound guys became fascinated with the pop they were hearing from my throws with the old style plastic. They went out of their way to pick it up on their microphones.\* Someone said, "He's the snapper" and Tom said, "No, He's the Captain, He's the Captain of Snap." Later a *Frisbee® World* came out with Michael "Captain Snap" Conger mentioned and the name stuck.





Third place went to Lisa Hunrichs and Randy Silvey. In fourth was Lori Daniels with Ted Oberhaus. Fifth and sixth went to G. Rose/Tommy Leitner, and Judy Robbins/Rick Sader, respectively. Next year the FPA Worlds will be in Hawaii. Aloha!

## ACCURACY

### Many Paths, One Point

At the World Masters, I was volunteered to run Accuracy. Trying to set up an event at a big tournament like this is much different from doing the same thing at a NEFA tournament. Unless you know EXACTLY what you're doing, all you need to do to lose complete control over the event you are supposedly running is to scratch your head for a nanosecond with a slightly perplexed expression and three or four guys who do know EXACTLY what they're doing (and of course Stick) will swoop in like scavenging birds and relieve you of your clipboard, cones and self-confidence. (The upside is you no longer have to DO anything.) But there you stand, in your virtual underwear, and by the time you can process what has happened, Harvey has entered everything in his laptop and people are barking "Hit" or "Miss".

But even when you've been stripped of your authority — which was tenuous in the first place since it was given to you by Greg Black — a well run event is a beautiful thing. Players can no longer blame the

event organizer, and instead must rely on the old standbys — sun, wind, knee, lack of practice, target stinks, skin-so-soft on their hands, and the genetic makeup of their parents. Once you've taken part in an event run right, it is very difficult to go back to NEFA's winging-it-the-best-we-can-hope-we-finish-before-dark format. The better an event is run, the fairer it seems and therefore the more credence it has. My advice to event organizers is to read the rules first. Second, get other people's advice BEFORE you set it up. Third, be ready to exercise your authority (say no) on the day of the event. Once your event begins, discussions on the format should already be over. In short, make sure of your own competence and stick to your own final decisions. (Which is different from being wrong while maintaining a stubborn inflexibility.) Finally, start setting up early enough; players should have ample time to practice at the actual site of competition.

Assuming it is run by the book, Accuracy has within itself the potential for more than mere triumph and tragedy. It's like bowling, darts, horseshoes, and throwing pennies at the specks below from the top of the Empire State Building — distances and

scoring are standardized. You shoot 28 times from seven different positions, three straight-on and two from each side. You have seven minutes to finish. You choose your own sequence of throwing positions. It is advantageous to be able to throw both backhand and forehand. And you can even choose the disc you throw (excluding most golf discs). A lot of players nowadays toss the faddish Zephyr, surely to be followed by another, better disc of the moment. A lot of us will switch our Accuracy discs five or six more times, a lifetime being long and full of second guessing. But if you play Ultimate the best Accuracy disc — rain, wind, sweaty palms, bad underwear, sleep apnea, or the conviction that your life's true mission is dangerous, violent and somehow involves Jodie Foster — is still Discraft's Ultrastar. Today's target, after the early days of the big circle, is now a 1.5 meter square, one meter off the ground. It's HUGE. We have plenty of time, and usually little cross wind, and still we miss and swear, miss and swear. It's a freaking howl!

Some tips for shooting Accuracy: Place the three discs (you are holding one) in an upside-down stack right in front of you so you don't have to move your feet to

retrieve them. Get a good catcher, someone who can retrieve your discs quickly. Aim for the imaginary center point of the target, not just the target. From either side position, put your lead foot on the corner of the square you are shooting from to improve the angle. Relax, take your time, don't get rattled by early misses. Seven minutes is an eternity.

While DDC has within itself the ability to make us feel moronically stupid, and Distance can expose us as weaklings, and Discathon reveals our flab and smoke-filled lungs, and Freestyle — with its fake nails, clothing coordination and dubious prancings — can (or should) make us question our sexuality, and Golf determines our mood, and five straight no-catches in SCF can ruin an entire tournament, a six in Accuracy is utterly common and utterly devastating. The kind of performance that can lead to thoughts of self-mutilation, a sort of self-imposed Islamic Law: "When I missed three out of four from the front straight-on position I knew I had to be punished...."

Here's a true story. On August 3 and 4 I took an Accuracy target and all the stuff you need to set up Accuracy — metric tape measure,

spray paint, score sheets, Compete Rules of Flying Disc Sports, cones, templates, clipboards and a target I made the day before with plastic pipe — to an Ultimate tournament. I promoted this event early and left the rules and scorecard out, explaining that this Accuracy competition was on the honor system, and that everybody had one official round. About 25 men and 7 women participated in their respective divisions. One woman shot 15, but left before the final, which included 5 finalists and 2 extraordinary (heavily whining) additional finalists. The winning score was 29 for two rounds, and there was much rejoicing. The Ultimate players loved Accuracy, as well as the Ultimate-disc 9-hole Disc Golf course set up there. If we want to expand our sport and NEFA numbers all we have to do is set up various disc competitions at Ultimate tournaments. Ultimate players are extremely competitive, welcoming all games of disc prowess. Part of the attraction of Accuracy for Ultimate players is that they stunk at it yet they can't believe they stunk quite as bad as they do

(the average score was around eight). I also set up a DDC field and bamboozled the famous Ultimate player Kenny Dobbins into being my partner for a quick DDC game. It was a blast, having the two worlds of disc meet. This is something we could do more often.

Anyway, I hereby volunteer to set up Accuracy at all NEFA tournaments and plan to set up a modified honor-system Accuracy competition at more Ultimate tournaments (I'm already signed up to do Accuracy at the Corporate Division A Ultimate tournament on August 24 and 25). I could be NEFA's Accuracy Guy, sort of like Discathon setup has become Rick Williams' domain and Greg Black has proven to be the most adept at organizing DDC. We should have one or two experienced specialists for each event, and give them titles, like Distance Dude and Freestyle Fairy. We could decide this at the beginning of the year and make the event specialists real NEFA officers. Why? Because we need to run our stuff better.

# A TALE OF TWO PYRAMIDS

with footnotes

A tournament means different things to different people. With a little stiffness in our backs, we drive home after three rounds of disc golf with our private images of the day, of opportunities missed and rolling discs with a mind of their own, of dark trees whispering subconsciously, "Psst Over here." We wonder about the thought flashes that took us lightly by surprise at the moment of release. They say that when great athletes play well, time slows for them. Maybe that's why time seemed to fly faster than the disc into that fat oak about 12 feet from tee 5. We ponder what might have been, had it not been for holes 12 and 16. Perhaps we think of fundamental weaknesses in our games, or whether to switch from a Roc to a Shark, a Stingray to a Cyclone, a Cyclone to an Xclone, from being miserable to sullenly satisfied with mediocrity, from disc golf to darts. Maybe we remember a hole in one scooting under the bench<sup>1</sup>, or four straight birdies. Many of us wouldn't mind leaving with a trophy and with it the primordial, instinctive, and probably even chemical joy of vanquishing (and hence heckling)<sup>2</sup> a rival friend. You see, for us playing well means something. And during the ride home, or the walk indoors

to a suddenly empty and quiet apartment — that's when the urchins in our brain come out and party, taking no prisoners, accepting no excuses. And if it gets really scary, our breathing gets shallow and we, with face muscles as limp as John Holmes in his later years, and unaware even of the hint of drool collecting on our lower lip, stare deep and wincingly into our soul — and there lie monsters.

It took place on a chilly and rainy day in November 1995, and on a semi-overcast day of cool humidity at the end of June 1996. I picked up a few sticks and won by eight strokes, Pete in one pocket, Toddy in the other. I spent two weeks fixing up the course, practiced about 100 rounds, cut down branches that annoyed me, perfected my putting at various "exotic" targets<sup>3</sup>, stayed relatively toxin-free, and lost the tournament by five strokes to Pete Anderson and two others by shooting a pathetic 1 over, losing in the process my nerve, concentration, confidence, ability to enjoy the game and a putter I left at hole 16. At one hideous moment late in the third round the vilest, hairiest monster in my head wandered over to my eardrum, and with sneering sarcasm, told me it wasn't my fault, bad luck with the trees, too much weedwhacking, distracted by the details of running a tournament, using the wrong

discs, windy, doesn't matter anyway. These were all lies.

I knew a flutist who developed, for no apparent physical reason, a spastic lip. Most of us have watched Shaq miss most of his free throws. We all know who Greg Norman is. I also know a disc golfer with monsters in his head. Maybe you do too.
