

tails that deliver us from chaos. Steve leaves the vice presidency without diminishing his duties as NEFA database manager, behind-the-scenes lobbyist and NEFA wise man. These two have held NEFA aloft for years, and appear certain to collectively remain our beacon of prudence for years to come.

Representing NEFA's more left wing, Doug Russell and Peter Anderson have successfully fought off the forces of inertia by introducing a pro series with prize money into our schedule. As Doug wrote earlier this year: "Focus on disc golf, have prize money and they will come." Not everyone agrees. Nevertheless, this move follows other regions, where disc golf is much bigger, and where prize money was instituted years ago. Pete has also drawn up (with help from Tom Whiffen and Mark Mudgett) a new NEFA Points System for 1997 that equitably reflects player skill, in contrast to past systems that overly stressed player attendance.

The appointment of Mark Mudgett as schedule coordinator rounds out the administration. His computer skills enhance his general competence and commitment. Mark has put our schedule on the Internet (http://www.shore.net/~mudgett/nefa/nefasced.htm). He also posts

NEFA-related news on the Internet's Usenet group rec.sport.disc. Mark, a certified PDGA official, is one of the new wave of computer-clever NEFA shakers who, for the past few months, have been bouncing Frisbee ideas off one another at the speed of e-mail.

So we have our little organization making our little decisions. Yes, we have a set of pole holes, a mailing list, 118 paying members, even a NEFA WEB page (thanks to Dave Jennings). We have a couple grand in a bank account. Still, without our tournament directors not much goes on. And regardless what NEFA suggests, tournament directors still do exactly as they please. TDs determine entry fees, whether prizes are trophies, money or ridiculous household items, the number of divisions, lunch or no lunch, toilets or no toilets, 18 poleholes or itsy bitsy rock rings, PDGA or WFDF or some sort of loose combination with several exceptions. This is the way it should be. It's NEFA's job to supply a few guidelines while still encouraging diversity. NEFA's role, rather than trying to force its TDs to follow a list of specific procedures, is to simply support them where it can. Implementing event consultants and state reps shows our commitment to helping TDs without meddling (much) more. This way we keep it friendly, we balance fun with competition, we structure our anarchy, and most important, we continue to spend our Saturdays walking around the woods with friends looking for small flying saucers.

Emotionally charged responses quickly flew back across the ether. Longwood Links Open The REAL Ice Bowl!

Twelve open and two advanced players braved a wintry blast to compete in the 1997 Longwood Links Open held in the southern hills of New Hampshire. Tournament director Toddy Brodeur and a collection of very dedicated workers spent a cold, wet Saturday clearing brush and trimming saplings to prepare this wooded, mountainous course for tournament day. Mother nature donated an eight-inch base of the white stuff topped with a thick crust of ice. Temperatures started in the high 20s, climbed into the mid 30s, and then began to fall shortly after lunch. The winds were gusty but never a major factor, although ice falling from coated tree limbs was an occasional distraction. The course featured rough, icy tee pads, slippery fairways, dangerous slopes, and plenty of trees. A real challenge!

All open players paid a 50-dollar entry fee, enhancing the drama of a close final round. After two rounds of play, three players had distanced themselves from the rest. Peter Anderson was tied with Kraig Steffen, and Toddy Broduer was three strokes behind them. In the top group, the final round had numerous lead changes, with honors switching at least six times. After five holes the three leaders were all tied up, and two of the three shared the lead four other times during the round. Pete held or was tied for the lead for sixteen holes but then coughed it up in the critical end game. Kraig played strong, finishing with a par and a birdie on the last two holes. Toddy and Pete each bogeyed and parred the last two, giving Kraig the victory by one stroke along with the largest single-person cash payout in NEFA's history.

NEFA Fundrayser at Pyramids

On January 11, in better than hideous weather, NEFA held its most successful fund raiser ever, attracting 24 players, and collecting almost \$400 for NEFA. Five dollars from each entry fee (\$10 for non-open, \$15 for open) and all of the moncy generated by the after-tournament auction flowed into NEFA's coffers.

Site of the traditional-format disc golf tournament was Pyramids in Leicester, MA. Kelley O'Loughlin and Jason Southwick served as hosts, with Kelley preparing all of the delicious food and doing most of the organizational stuff, while Jason contributed by having Rick Williams tally scores and Pete Anderson calculate prize money. Many of the awards and almost all of the auction items were brought by the players themselves. Special thanks to Steve Hartwell and Dave Johnson for donating a Frisbie pie tin and a 1970 Frisbee Horseshoes game, both valuable collectors' items.

The mature Pyramids course was at its longest and most open, and sported the most pole holes in its nine-year history (12). Six of the holes had been modified or moved outright, and great efforts had been made to measure hole distance, cut alternate flight paths, smooth tees, remove brush, and furnish the course with a reasonable level of target diversity. Nevertheless, one small milk crate occasioned a cacophony of whining not unlike the pathetic mewing of abandoned kittens.

The tournament day transitioned smoothly from play to awards to auction to the mandatory survivors' party up the road at Kelley and Jason's. Oddly familiar trophies and some Christmas clutter were recycled as prizes for winners and near winners, which included most participants. The auction was perhaps the most exciting part of the day, in particular when Pete Anderson and Bill MacWilliams kept raising each other for the coveted Frisbie pie tin. Bill, with a forlorn glance into his wallet, was finally forced to bow out, leaving Pete the winner, theoretically speaking.



Your Money—Where Is It Now?

Several NEFA members have inquired as to a) where their money goes when they join NEFA, b) what the money is used for, and c) why is Rick always taking trips to Bermuda? As long-time treasurer of the New England Flying disc Association, I thought I would explain to the new members (and to old members with failing memories) just what NEFA does with your money.

In the 1995 Spring issue of NEFA News I submitted a 1994 annual financial report, which included all income, expenses, and the account balance. Not much has changed in the income/expense categories since 1994. There are basically three sources of income: Membership Dues, Tournaments, and Sales. The \$10 membership fee makes up 50 percent of NEFA's total income. This includes new members as well as renewals. Unfortunately, each year about 50 NEFA members do not renew their membership. The good news is that almost 70 new members join NEFA each year. With the current NEFA membership around 150 people, \$1,500 goes into the treasury. Tournaments generate 45 percent of NEFA's total income. Money from tournaments includes the rental of NEFA's pole holes for disc golf (\$25 for 18 baskets, what a bargain!), and the contribution from entry fees that state tournaments (\$2 per player) and NEFA Points tournaments (\$1 per player) generate. The annual NEFA Fundraiser tournament also contributes to the treasury. The remaining 5 percent of income is from the sale of NLFA mini discs, visors, newsletters, and shirts.

Now for expenses. There are three areas of expense: Newsletter, Office, and Equipment. The big expense is the newsletter. It eats up 70 percent of NEFA's total expenses. This includes the printing costs, labels, and mailing of four newsletters a year. Office includes lots of miscellaneous things like mailing labels, postage, envelopes, bank fees, post office fees, NEFA mini discs, ace awards, banners, etc. Office expenses are 20 percent of total expenses. The remaining 10 percent of expenses is categorized as equipment, and refers to tournament items, like DDC courts, accuracy targets, or stop watches. Also included is the maintenance of the NEFA trailer, which transports the pole holes, and the maintenance of the pole holes (chains, number plates, etc.).

So how much money are we talking about? Typically NEFA's total yearly income is around \$3,000 and total expenses run at \$2,900, so NEFA is usually in the black. The money is in a checking account, earning a meager interest. Decisions on spending the money are usually done at the Open NEFA Meetings that take place twice a year. There has been some grumbling about money from the state tournaments going to NEFA (Taxation without Representation??). In

the past, \$2 per player from registration fees at state tournaments (i.e. Maine. New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and New Englands) would go to the NEFA treasury. This brings in between \$700 and \$1,100 each year, depending on player turnout at these tournaments. Starting this year NEFA will get 1\$ from each player at the other NEFA Points events. This will no doubt boost our budget.

The biggest part of the budget is what you have in your hand—the newsletter. Printing 200 copies of the newsletter costs around \$400. In the past, I have suggested that the newsletter be abandoned for a more simplified flyer that contains upcoming events and tournament results. This would save a lot of money for NEFA, but it wasn't a popular suggestion.

So what do you get for your \$10 membership? For \$10 you get \$18 worth of material in the form of flyers and newsletters, plus an additional savings of \$10 - \$40 in tournament entry fees. Since there are four newsletters a year and each newsletter costs \$2 apiece for printing and \$.78 for mailing, that's \$11.12 per year per person for the newsletter.

There are 20 to 30 events per year with flyer mailings for most of them. That's an additional \$6.40 for flyer mailings per person per year, for a total of \$17.52. Add on the cost of mailing labels and \$18 is not an unreasonable cost for one person in a year. Tournament entry fees usually have a \$2 savings for current NEFA members. Ten tournaments would be a savings of \$20. Ten dollars per year is certainly a good deal. Some people think it's too good, and would like to see the membership dues increased. For now, dues will remain at \$10 for 1997.

If you have ideas on how to generate more income for NEFA or how to spend NEFA's treasury, then attend a NEFA Open Meeting, write a letter to the NEFA PO Box, send me some e-mail, or talk to a NEFA officer. In the meantime, I'll be in Bermuda. Thanks.

Playing for Cash

Concerning the subject of playing for cash prizes, there are several perspectives. But from the player's point of view, soon we in NEFA may be hearing the kind of sandbagging complaints usually reserved for more traditional sports.

At any given NEFA tourney there is a small group of people with the skill level to be near the top five spots and these few will have their trips and entry fees funded by the other players in the open division who play regularly but do not place. These are some of the supporting players of the sport and if they feel that they are paying for someone else's gig they might be turned off and no longer wish to attend. Of course these players do have the option of switching down a division.

Which raises the tricky and as-yet undefined question of how players wind up in the divisions they're in. Up to now players at NEFA tournaments have decided which division to play in, generally in accordance with tournament guidelines and implications. Many players enjoyed competing in the open division. By putting an extra price on playing in the open division we may be discouraging a group of players from coming to our tournaments.

I've run tournaments where, for a \$20 entry fee, everyone gets a player package and a modest lunch. Still the bitching has been unbelievable. I'd hate to see player reaction if I forked over most of this to a few top players.

This brings us to another sticky point for the TDs. As a rule almost every tournament that I've run has cost me money. Under the currently-proposed system of pro play, a TD could take 80 percent of entry fees and put them back as cash payouts to the top-finishing open players. This suggests that a tourney might be run on only 20 percent of the entry fees. I've run tournaments where, for a \$20 entry fee, everyone gets a player package and a modest lunch. Still the bitching has been unbelievable. I'd hate to see player reaction if I forked over most of this to a few top players.

Many people would be surprised to learn how much it costs to run a tournament. A typical NEFA tournament hosts 50 people. With an entry fee of \$20 that makes \$1,000. Does \$800 of this go to the open winners' pot or just the money collected from the open players? It almost doesn't matter. After portojohn rental, copying and mailing flyers, trophies in each of six divisions for maybe three events, you as TD are digging deep into personal funds.

With prizes for overall, closest to the pin, longest drive, etc., you may be handing out 50 prizes, which could easily cost as much as \$500. Totaled up, expenses in this scenario come to about \$700. But there is also the problem of estimating budgets accurately. If it rains and only 40 people come you're left with \$100 (\$800 - \$700) in the black—for that brief second before you remember "little" expenses like phone calls and tournament supplies.

By giving everyone lunch and an interesting player's package, instead of spending the entry fees on the few winners at the top, a TD can make sure that everyone goes home with something fun and maybe even useful. Let's keep the wealth more evenly distributed within NEFA by letting players (top or otherwise) arrange side bets if they want to play for money. Open division prize money makes it harder for TDs to put on quality events at a reasonable cost to the average player. Cash may not bring the boon some people are predicting.

Competing for Cash

We all attend NEFA tournaments for different reasons: to have fun with friends, play the temporary courses we set up once a year, and just to play disc sports—the favorite pastime of many of us. But many attend primarily for the competition. That's why we split players into different divisions, that's why we give prizes to the "top" performers of the day. Competition is what organized tournaments are all about. It motivates us to perform at our highest level. Competition motivates excellence. Excellence, I think, is what we all are striving for, and excellence should be rewarded. That's why we give trophies to the winners and that's why the open division should have a cash payout.

Personally, I thrive on competition. One of my greatest joys is being pitted against other players who perform at or above my level play. I feel that when the open division plays for cash it pushes players to perform at their best, and that's what I look forward to when I participate in disc tournaments. What is the sense of competing if your opponents don't care about the outcome? Playing for cash helps to motivate many players right up to the last round or into the finals of the last event. And besides ... it's fun!

To Tournament Directors: The decision whether or not to pay the open division is yours alone. If you choose to have cash prizes, the money going to the open division payout should come from the open players. The prizes given to the non-open divisions should be paid for by non-open players. The overhead costs of a tournament (e.g., lunch, mailings, portable toilets and prizes) should be spread among all

of the players. We can't always fulfill this ideal (I know I never do) but that's what we should strive for. I suggest that TDs arrange for prizes based on the largest possible number of players. Trophies could be given to first place in each division—paid for by everyone. For each nonopen division, the top three finishers should win discs and other disc-oriented

prizes. If your event doesn't draw enough players to pay for all the prizes, don't give them all away! Perhaps NEFA could buy them from you at cost and transfer them to other TDs for future events. Or you could keep the leftover discs and sell them for a profit later on. No TD should take a loss for organizing a tournament. Conversely, TDs shouldn't be looking to pay their rent from tournament profits either. A golden rule for TDs is to be fair to all players; complaints will be few if we try to uphold this principle.

Concerning sandbagging and having players select their own divisions, I feel that people should play in whatever division they want at any given tournament. If people want to win by sandbagging, let them do it; their victories will be hollow and everyone will know it. Peer pressure should be all we need to decide which division to compete in. If you feel that you will never finish in the top third of the open division and that bothers you, then maybe you should switch divisions. If however, you want to keep improving your skills and testing them, then you should compete in the division which allows you to play against people with skills equal to or greater than your own.

Prize money for NEFA's open golfers will rarely add more than \$10 to the open division entry fee. This is a small price to pay to compete against the best players in our area. Prize money—even five or ten dollars per person—raises the drama of an event without creating a small group of funded elite. Remember that within NEFA's pro series, prize money is paid out to the top third, which is an attainable goal for many players. I also feel that prize money may draw more people to tournaments, rather than scaring them away. The 80 people at this year's Frozen Fruits bears this out. So let's take the rest of the disc golf world as an example and use prize money to enhance the growth of our sport. No one's going to get rich playing disc sports in New England (I know I won't be quitting my day job). And no one's going to go broke either. So why not add a little excitement?

Dear NEFA News.

Thanks for publishing Adam Fasciolo's article on the CRPA's disc golf exhibit and my "Air Mail" letter letting folks know about the existence of a State's Recreation and Parks Association. I can see great things happening in the future with the help of the Connecticut Rec. & Parks Association.

I really would like to emphasize to NEFA and its members that any state's Recreation and Parks Association can accelerate the establishment of public disc golf courses, especially in larger cities. To expand our sport we have to organize and hold events in populated communities. Contacting local parks and recreation officials is an excellent start.

Minutes from the 26 February 1997 Open NEFA Meeting taken by Rick Williams

An Open NEFA Meeting was held on February 26, 1997 at the Irish Embassy Pub on Route 106 in Easton, MA. It started at 8:00 p.m. and ended at 10:10 p.m. In attendance were Tom Whiffen, Toddy Brodeur, Steve Hartwell, Nancy Donnelly-Malakhoff, Kelley O'Loughlin, Mark Mudgett, Jason Southwick, and Rick Williams.

Membership Report: Steve Hartwell reported that there are 91 current NEFA members, 95 members that have not yet renewed from 1996, and 64 people from 1995 that did not renew in 1996. Phoning and a postcard mailing were discussed to remind people to renew. It was agreed that postcards will be mailed to 94, 95 and 96 members. Included in the postcard will be listings of the next few upcoming events, including the World's Biggest Disc Golf Weekend at three sites in New England, and that an incentive to renew membership is the discount in tournament fees for current members.

Treasurer's Report: Rick Williams showed the general expenses and income of 1996. The current account balance is \$2,100. The auction at the recent NEFA Fundraiser tournament was a huge boost to the treasury. It was agreed that for 1997, income from state tournaments and from the NEFA Disc Golf Championship Series is needed. As in the past, State Overall Championships (RI, CT, VT, MA) and the New England Overall Championships will donate \$2/player from entry fees. Tournaments that are sanctioned for the 1997 Golf Series will donate \$1/player to NEFA.

NEFA News Newsletter: Jason Southwick extended the submission deadline for this issue to April 1st. During the open floor discussion, it was agreed that anyone who submits photographs that get published in the NEFA News will be paid \$5 per photo.

1997 Schedule: Mark Mudgett is maintaining an up-to-date schedule on the World Wide Web. The address for the NEFA Schedule is http://www.shore.net/~mudgett/nefa/nefasced.htm.

NEFA Poleholes and Trailer: T.M. Dyer said he'd be willing to upgrade the trailer with new shocks and other needed maintenance. Lettering the side of the trailer with "NEFA" was discussed, but put on hold. Nancy Malakhoff said she would create a sign for the trailer bed describing the best way to load and unload the pole holes if someone can draw a schematic for this that she can refer to. Jason Southwick has found a NEFA polehole that disappeared from his course years ago. He will gladly bring it to tournaments requiring an 18th pole hole (NEFA owns 17 for rent).

NEFA Disc Golf Series: Tournament directors will be contacted to determine whether their event will be part of the Series. A tournament director checklist will be sent to the TDs. Some of the items are mandatory (i.e., at least two rounds), and some are suggestions (i.e., prizes). The format of the Series was amended so that women and juniors must attend at least four events for their points to count. Players in all other divisions must attend at least seven events.

Publicity: Brian Traichel was suggested as the Publicity Manager. Nancy Donnelly-Malakhoff will develop a press pack for TDs. Tom Whiffen will develop the TD Checklist. Todd Brodeur will develop a NEFA Handbook.

State Representatives: The idea for each New England state to have a representative was discussed. The state representative would be a contact person who expresses the state's needs to NEFA and helps with information transfer to and from the NEFA officers. The following persons were nominated. Maine: Greg Hinkley and Bob Enman. New Hampshire: Pete Anderson and Roy Doar. Vermont: Paul Olander, Brock Pitzer, and John O'Gorman. Massachusetts: Tom Whiffen. Rhode Island: T.M. Dyer. Connecticut: Brian Traichel and Adam Fasciolo. Tom Whiffen will call the nominees.

World's Biggest Disc Golf Weekend: Everyone agreed to target Amesbury as the course to get as many participants as possible in order to win a free pole hole set. UPDATE: We have since learned that Amesbury will not be trying to win the poles holes this year.

NEFA Membership Cards: Issuing membership cards to NEFA members was originally suggested at a NEFA meeting a few years ago by Brian Traichel and Herb Bush. Steve Hartwell will research the financial aspects of implementing this idea.

Open Floor Discussion: New NEFA Logo: Some felt a new logo is needed. A contest will be held for the new NEFA logo. Details of the contest will appear in the NEFA News. Meetings On Line: Having NEFA meetings or chat sessions "on line" was discussed. Too many people are not equipped for this, so open meetings will continue as they are. NEFA Fundraiser: It was decided that two fund raiser tournaments a year would be a good idea.

Event Consultants: To help tournament directors hosting a multi-event format at their tournament, Event Consultants could prove useful. The Event Consultant would not necessarily run the event the day of the tournament, but would be someone who knows the rules, procedures and logistics for running the event. Volunteer Event Consultants include Tom Whiffen for distance, Rick Williams for discathon, Jason Southwick for MTA, Mark Mudgett for accuracy, and Toddy Brodeur for freestyle. The position of DDC Consultant is still open. Everyone agreed that most TDs know how to run disc golf.
