





Hello fellow friends in NEFA. I hope this summer was a fun, relaxing and enjoyable one for all of you. I'd like to start by talking about Maine—the State called "Vacationland" which boasts "the way life should be" and indeed it is. Jason and I fell under its charms again this summer on our weeklong odyssey to each of its eight public disc golf courses (read Jason's article in this issue for more details). In fact, on returning we learned another ninth public disc golf course has opened in Naples. So for disc golf lovers, Maine is indeed a Mecca. Massachusetts is also well on its way. While I keep reading and hearing that disc golf is an "exploding" sport, I now have reason to believe it. Since we made Pyramids a public course, the number of people coming to play grows each week. The same holds true for Buffumville, now with 18 permanent pole holes, where more and more people from all walks of life are showing up to learn this new sport. Thanks to Dave Balkema, there is now a public disc golf course at Borderland Park in Easton, MA, where nine of the NEFA pole holes now reside! TM Dyer is expanding the course at Ninigrit Park in Charlestown, RI and should have 18 poleholes in the ground soon. Greg Hinkley just received a NEFA grant to develop disc golf courses in the Portland, Maine area. What a great time for us to try and expand the boom into the rest of the New England states. Let us know if you're aware of other courses that are not listed in this publication or if you want help in creating your own course.

Fall foliage leads us to the end of the "official" NEFA POINTS Series that wrapped up on October 2, 1999 at Burgess Park on Cape Cod. Check out Gordy Adell's NEFA Points Standings at www.nefa.com. They will also be included in the next issue of the NEFA News (we just didn't have room this time). And many thanks to Gordy for his continuing and tireless efforts to compile and publish these results for us.

We look forward to the next new NEFA News!

There is always a need for "volunteers" in NEFA. If you have the desire, the skills and the time, consider taking on an official function within our organization. 

Mass Hallucinations: A Very Borderland Dream

Now, these days I am as an ant hill to mighty Doug's termite mound — I'm in another league craning my neck. 

While a number of NEFA members were testing their abilities at the PDGA Worlds this past August, Kelley, our dog Pierre and I decided to take a trip north to play and critique the eight disc golf courses of Maine. Here's our story.

D 'N D Disc Golf, Sidney

Foot for stroke, D 'N D Disc Golf probably offers the most difficult golfing in Maine, with twisting tunnels through evergreen and hardwood, and small trees belligerently poised in mid-fairway to thwart indecisive shots. Tom Tillson admits his friends have accused him of making a lefty course (Tom is left-handed), and maybe a southpaw influence can be seen in the abundance of left to right doglegs — righties bring your forehands.

Short, tight and at times sadistic, The Sidney D 'N D (named after Tammy and Tom's children) is not for those who dislike low ceilings, hate narrow fairways, or have to throw 400 feet in an open field to express themselves. But if you enjoy a good challenge, if you love playing new courses, and if you can throw with finesse, you should give this course a try before Tom and brother Tim cut down too many trees and move the poleholes back.

Just writing about it now makes me want to go back there, where the pig's skull mocked me, and I lost my Shark in darkness on 17, eventually carding a six and gacking my chances at besting a course record of 55. Which won't last long.


Tom credits Jay Holman (Hapana, Trenton) as the person who first gave him the idea to build his own course years ago when the two worked together. The plastic-chained TriState poleholes may further infuriate the PDGA sensibilities of golfers hailing from outside New England. All the more reason to go there.

Eaton Mountain

Eaton Mountain Camp Grounds have mountain bike trails, hiking, a swimming pool, water slide, softball fields, volley ball court, badminton, horseshoes, nearby fishing, game room, full bar and restaurant, showers, and — since just a few months ago — disc golf.

The bathrooms are excellent.



The course climbs for 11 holes on ski slopes, circles around at the top for holes 12 - 14, leads you across a field and through a truck road between two slopes for holes 15 and 16, before finally descending the last two holes. Hole 17 goes 510 feet practically straight down and right, requiring a slightly anheizing putter. Go a little too far right and you're in the trees. Hole 18 is harder to reach, moving down more gradually and left to right 380 feet.

So...imagine playing disc golf up a ski slope and, after a few breaks in the climb through slope-connecting paths, you reap the reward of throwing down a couple of shots. Also try to imagine a 210 hole you can't reach (I guess a Roc was not the right choice there). Welcome to Eaton Mountain, where you may just decide to take the waterslide down hole 18. We look forward to further development. Murmurs of a redesigned Eaton Mountain are in the air, along with talk about a second 18. We can only hope.



Beaver Brook, North Monmouth

On the western side of a cluster of six disc golf courses, Beaver Brook was named by all other Maine disc golf course owners as both influential and inspirational in their own course's development. Established in 1975 by Ed Headrick, Beaver Brook is the oldest permanent polehole course in New England, and perhaps also the most inviting for the novice player. The short, carved fairways of this perennial Maine States site are well-trampled and well-designed. The course is a long-standing favorite of locals as well as travelling NEFA Points players. Scores in the 40s are not uncommon. Doug Russell and Peter Anderson share the record (as far as we can tell) at 41 — a very honest record considering the course hasn't changed in years.

In addition to disc golf, Beaver Brook Campground has showers, pool and lake swimming, a game room, bass fishing, boat and canoe rentals, a bunch of outdoor games, and a multitude of other attractions for families. The store has beer, snacks, and camping necessities until closing time around 8 or so. Lightning discs are also on sale at reduced prices.

Scorecards with backside map are available at the store/office, but disregard the distances. Tom Whiffen measured the course a few years back with a wheel. The actual distances are published in Tom's 1995 New England Disc Golf Course Directory, which incidentally lists the only two Maine Courses to exist at that time: Beaver Brook and a now defunct course at Old Orchard Beach.

Burnsboro, Vassalboro


Ever since becoming a dog owner I've become conflicted between ensuring my dog's absolute happiness, and being considerate to other golfers. I have very naturally slipped into the dog-owners conviction that everything our dog does is cute and/or cool, or at the very worst "something he *never* does!" Sometimes our friends are annoyed, though they seldom say anything. We appreciate any course owner who lets our dog run free. At Burnsboro, Pierre enjoyed the canine version of a field day, barking incessantly and fighting with at least half of the other four dogs roaming free during our rounds. Good dog. Have a biscuit.

Aside from being recently mowed at the time of our visit, Burnsboro has tons of personality. The home-grown course's 18 holes — with *two* sets of tees — consist of seven individually-named poleholes shot at from different angles — over a pond every which way, a big lawn, a gravel road, and several acres of very cleared woods. The heizer and anheizer shots are well mixed, and the Hinkley influence can be seen in the mostly middle-distance drives. The seven targets are good metal poleholes emulated from an early, classic model.

Rick, Pete, and Bob Burns designed the current course with Greg Hinkley. Ambitious plans for expansion, including 11 more poleholes, are in the works. Rick Burns would like to hold the Maine States there in 2001, with camping and other frills.

We play one round of singles and one round of doubles with at least six people, including three named Burns. Kelley becomes the first woman ever to throw from the far tees, thus establishing a new record. Dusk, the best part of any disc golf day, descends, and the milling begins. Why must we leave? Let's keep talking deep into the night, and when the sun comes up we'll piss on it! ...Time to go.

Enman Field Beauty and Beast, Brunswick

In many ways Enman Field has the best courses in New England — two of them side by side — with a tremendous variety of distances and flight paths. The courses are both well over twice as long as Beaver Brook, and challenge the arm and our ability to escape disaster. Enman Field I, established in 1996, is called The Beast. The newer course, Enman II or The Beauty, was completed a year later. Both are par 72, meander through woods and fields, and lead you up and down paths made just for the purpose you are there. Both courses have very short and very long holes, with several par fives. This is a great place to learn the total game.

Enormously successful for a purely disc golf operation, Enman Field is open from 10 to "dark:30" every day of the year. Work on the course is continual, and the clubhouse offers the full spectrum of discs on sale at retail prices, along with snacks and a big cooler full of non-alcoholic beverages. Scorecards are provided, and Enman Field computes handicaps for all scores handed in. Enman Field disc golf pencils are also part of the package: \$3 for a round, \$6 for the day. There's a soft drink vending machine on Hole 11 of the Beast, where you can also find the site's third portable toilet.

Carving a disc golf existence out of Maine woods is not something you can do on off-weekends. Maine course owners have spent hundreds of hours of honest hard work chopping and lopping and mowing and trimming. The chainsaw played a major role, as did pole saws and string trimmers. Enman Field has taken fairway clearing machinery to industrial levels, with a chipper, a gas-powered pole saw, and several heavy-duty brush-mowing machines. The result is two huge courses with wide yet treacherous fairways — though the "rough" on the edges of fairways has been thinned gradually over the years. New signs have recently been added, testimony to continual development. Personally, this is where I like to play. You'll see Pete and Doug there a lot, too, stuffing money into their pockets and big trophies into their cars.

Grassyland a.k.a. Great Shot, West Gardiner

Though a thousand feet shorter and a little bit flatter, this excellent course combines the kind of challenges and variety that Enman Field offers. Designed in 1997 by Jack Downs, Mike Pratt, and owner Bob Grasse, this rapidly evolving course has a nice



mixture of manicured open-field holes, and treacherous adventures through the Maine forest. With long and short, left and right holes, Great Shot (as I like to call it) requires a full bag of discs, and dares you to display a complete range of shots.

In a recent telephone interview, Greg Hinkley spoke of developments at the course. Bob Grasse has bought a tractor specifically for course improvements, and locals like Jason Pratt, Scott Ware, Mike Pratt and Jack Downs have contributed near obsessive phases of toil. Mike Pratt, when asked, names hole 11 as his favorite — a straight 344' slightly uphill shot, with a few key trees you have to miss. Mike indicates that construction at Grassyland is continuing with great bursts of energy, and that much has been cleared and beautified since August. The Grasses are really nice people, too.

Great Shot is destined to attract and train another batch of top-notch Maine golfers, whose contributions at future tournaments will help defray the travel expenses of golfers from Mass. Great Shot also represents an alternative to the other pay-to-play sites in the area (See map page 7).

Kelley and I shoot a 73 and a 55 from the same tees. I imagine joining the course maintenance crew, and living in Bob's clubhouse for a week or two. But plans take precedence, and we leave much too soon.

Hapana, Trenton

Before this year, Jay Holman's Hapana brought in a few local players a day. This season the course routinely attracts 50 happy customers a day. Some bring their own discs and/or frisbees (lids), others use free loaner *frisbies*. The admission price of \$3 a round and \$5 a day is worth every penny.

Added to the original, flatter 10, are a winding new eight with hilly elevation twists, and hobbit-esque paths that curve beneath a canopy of spruce trees leading from hole to tee. Attractively painted signs designate hole number and distance, and clearly lead the way. With just a few holes virtually impossible to birdie, the course record of 46 (as of August 13) is well within reach.

Generally, like most of the courses in Maine, Hapana is short and tight, with some holes in an open field near the clubhouse. There are also two mandatory doglegs, several short, straight fairways through a lot of small and medium-sized trees, widely varying left and right curves, and a couple long, very hard holes. A perfect set of 18 genuine DGA double-chain Mach III poleholes lend an air of high-tech sheen to an otherwise rustic setting.

Describing the development of his exclusively disc golf business, Jay says, "Boom". We look around and about 10 cars sit in the large gravel parking lot. It's Thursday afternoon and at least two dozen people, mostly 20- and 30-something local males — and one girl — are out on the course. In a letter written shortly after our visit, Jay speculates on his sudden success: "Increased price, strong local economy, longevity, course improvements, good weather, impending Y2K disaster..."

The biggest single improvement at Hapana — aside from the addition of eight superbly designed holes — are the tees. The previously rooty, lumpy tees have been replaced with expansive wood-chip beds bolstered on three sides by logs. The luxury of a runup is easily afforded, and most tees seem at least 10 feet wide. Plus, for the first time ever at Hapana, golf discs are available for around \$10 apiece.

Inside Jay's clubhouse, whose roof is festooned with tens of frisbees, a sign bears two simple words that express the attitude of the place better than I can: Rules ... Relax.

Maine Disc Golf Courses in General

Most of the courses were at least dotted with trashcans, and some owners have adopted the idea of placing coffee cans filled with sand at tees for smokers' convenience, though some smokers still find it more convenient to throw their butts on the ground. The seven pay-to-play courses had scorecards, the best being the ones made of cardboard with a map on the back. Some of the cards included course distances and pars, which is always nice to have. None of the scorecards had columns for front and back nine. Only Burnsboro is the standard 54 par; the others range from 57 to 72. Price of the seven pay-to-play courses range from \$2.50 to \$3 a round, and \$4 to \$6 for a day — quite a deal if you consider the price of ball golf or, for that matter, a sixpack of beer.

These courses are wooded by national standards, and much cutting was required on all of them. You don't need a mammoth Texas arm to score well. And you don't throw many rollers, except short ones to escape out of "jail". More important skills include hitting the fairways, and knowing how to overcome disappointment. Y

A Hot Time in The City

The 1999 PDGA Amateur World Championships in K.C.

"Fore!", "Heads up!", and "Look out!" are the expected cries near any fairway at a major disc golf event. This is expected out on the course. However, guests passing through a lounge, dining area, or pool of a well-known hotel chain probably don't expect to hear "Welcome to the Mission-Overland Park Holiday Inn of Kansas City, could you please, WATCHOUT!, uh check in here...." as a barrage of minis and putters zoom overhead and roll past their feet.


This was the interesting scenario occurring in and around the "Holidome" at the host hotel of the 1999 PDGA World Amateur Disc Golf Championships for a week in late July. In the truest sense, the hotel was taken over by a few hundred players representing almost every state and Canada (which, as baseball fans understand, is the entire world). Pole holes were in the lobby, and mini-poleholes in every corridor and stairway. For some reason, the hotel staff didn't seem to mind, but I guess that attitude was because 16 Little League Teams had just checked out.

The amazing AM Worlds experience was shared by your very own NEFA representatives: Brock Pitzer, Mike Dussault, Tim Walsh, John O'Gorman, and I.

Tournament Strategy was simple. Get to the ice machine by 6:15am. This was the week where the heat index surpassed 115 degrees, and the thermometer read a kindly 101 degrees at 7:30pm each evening. The hotel was out of face towels by day two as a soaked rag became mandatory head gear. The advanced players got word quickly that some master players were "throwing for shade" rather than upshot position.

Two rounds a day — at different courses — was demanding and exhausting. And forget those huge hills at the "Swope Park" and "Water Works Park" courses — most of the energy spent was scurrying to be one of the three players in your five-some who could fit into the meager shade offered by a scrub tree at the aptly-named "Prairie Center" while dragging your bag, water jugs, and three-legged chair. Even the woodsy rough at "Roseland Park" was desirable, slightly cooling relief, unless you went all the way down into the ravine and declared a two-stroke "unsafe lie" (recommended by site director!) since you knew it would take three strokes to get back to the fairway anyway.

The four courses were 20 to 45 minutes apart, spread throughout Kansas City and Kansas City — no redundancy. Twice a day you could legitimately turn to a furry little critter and say "I have a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore." Of course, twice a day you could just as easily say "I have a feeling we're not in Missouri anymore..." Gratefully these cities occupy the same time zone, a dimension where (surprise!) "NEFA time" was nowhere to be found. Tee and course assignments



were posted each night. The following morning an air-horn blared twice at 8:58am and then again that afternoon at 1:58pm. Two minutes later you were either on the correct course teeing off, or you yourself were teed off — having just earned par plus four, end of discussion.

We New Englanders placed respectably against players who compete regularly in PDGA events. In Advanced, Mike finished 25th after the semi-finals (second cut), Tim was 56th having survived the 1st cut, John 88th, and Brock 124th out of 180 players. John's finish was particularly heart-breaking as the first cut did not allow for a situation where ties would cause Friday's field to have over 90 players; his three-way tie left him out of the heat. I finished 23rd in Masters out of 90.

We were able to show some New England muscle in some of the other events during the week, competing against over 140 players. Brock demonstrated all-round talent by finishing in the top 10 in mini-golf, putting, and in "Choose Your Partner Doubles" along with Mike D. Tim W. tied for 4th and I tied for 2nd in mini-golf which used nine gold-plated mini baskets around the perimeter of the Holiday Inn. (If only I'd seen the backside of that *#%\$ storm drain...)

One highlight of the week was meeting the outstanding players who we got to play with each round. The golf was great. So were the french fries and salads at Kansas City's finest Steak House. And, in case you wonder, my reputation for "slow" play remains intact along with my record for most pump-fakes on a putt (nine), although I'm now merely approaching the 30-second limit rather than exceeding it.

At this time we players extend our thanks to NEFA's webmeister Scott Connell for updating our singles results on the NEFA discussion page, and for those of you who followed our scores and exploits to cheer us on. We felt and appreciated everyone's support! And thanks to Rick Rothstein, the AM Worlds Tournament Director, for extending a special invitation to New England players this year; and an amazing crew of KC volunteers who "took great care to take great care of us!"

Hopefully more New Englanders will find the opportunity to participate in this type of event. In 2000 the AM Worlds and Pro Worlds will be simultaneously held in the Ann Arbor, Michigan area in early August — an exciting opportunity to play at your highest level, and see how the top pros in the world have mastered the game. The last chance (unless another PDGA event is scheduled) to earn points in 1999 towards a 2000 invitation will be at the Warwick, NY tournament on October 16th, unless you are able to travel beyond Region 14 prior to the end of the year.

Oh yeah: Distance is the name of the game out west — the reach-back and the follow-through are so crucial. Holes 350 to 400 feet are more than common. When you see a dozen teen players parking these holes you can only sigh... or start workin' on those rollers, cut-rollers, high rollers & low rollers! 🍷


